The infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. Allen, Loretta Olive, was christened at the Catholic Church, Abita Springs, last Sunday.

The mast this year is fine, and the woods are full of nuts and acorns. The pigs will live high from now until sausage making time.

The material is arriving on the ground for Mr. A. Blattler's new residence, opposite the Farmer office. Edgar Brothers have the contract for its erection.

The new railroad depot rapidly nearing completion, and will be a great improvement in the way of accommodation to the traveling public and freight capacity.

The new railroad schedule is a great improvement, especially in placing the mails here at a much earlier hour than heretofore, an item which is highly appreciated by the public.

The fine Lake steamer New Camelia made her last trip of the season last Sunday. She has gone into winter quarters at Madisonville, and will be thoroughly overhauled during the winter months.

Base ball is still being played in New Orleans, and will probably be continued all winter. The same could be done in Covington, as our temperate climate is seldom too cool for the National game.

Court Items

District Court, special jury term, convened last Monday, with Judge Thos. M. Burns on the bench, District Attorney J. B. Lancaster in attendance.

The first case tried was that of Almo Grantham, J. P. Carpenter, Rhet Jenkins and N. W. Watts, charged with the murder of Hugh Parker. Almo Grantham was placed on trial, the jury bringing in a verdict of not guilty, and the others were not crossed.

State vs. Will Mason, colored, charge with murder. Found guilty as charged, without capital punishment.

State vs. Will Benton, accused of murder, the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty.

State vs. Andrew Thompson, accused of murder, released on \$2000.00 bonds, to appear for trial at the next term of court.

We will publish the full proceedings next week, as Court is still in session as we go to press.

The large elevated water tank of the railroad company collapsed last Thursday night.

A campaign for a fair in every parish in Louisiana has been started by the Board of Agriculture and Immigration, to culminate in a State fair at Lake Rouge. The Legislature will be asked for an appropriation.

An unfortunate shooting affair occurred last Monday, near Vidalia, when August Parker was shot in the knee by his brother, Adolph Parker, during a quarrel which originated from the latter's boggie breaking into and destroying August's potato and peanut patch. The wounded man was taken to the Hospital in New Orleans, and warrants were issued by Sheriff Brewster for the arrest of Adolph Parker. He was arrested Thursday afternoon.

The Fourth Troop, First Squadron of Cavalry, Louisiana National Guard, was mustered into service last Saturday night. The State was represented by Adjutant General D. T. Stafford and Assistant Adjutant General C. Robert Churchhill, accompanied by Captain W. S. Hero, of the First Troop. The Fourth Troop is officered by Captain O. J. Toujan, First Lieutenant A. T. Witbeck, and Second Lieutenant Oliver Montagnet. All the commissioned and noncommissioned officers have seen service, either in the State or in the regular Army, and many of the privates are veterans.

Owing to the inclemency of the weather, a number of the recruits were unable to be present, but will be mustered in at a later date. General Stafford says the troop is composed of a fine body of men, and give promise of developing into one of the best cavalry troops in the State.
