Railroad Tax Carries.

The vote on the special property tax at the election held here Tuesday resulted in a victory for the new railroad. The total vote cast was 123,590, of which eighty-seven were in favor of the tax and four against it. The total value of property in the town is \$1,235,900, of which \$123,590 is for the tax. By the terms of the agreement with the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern Railroad, the town is to levy a 5-mill tax for ten years, or as much thereof as will amount annually to \$230,000, on condition that no part of the amount be available until the bonds are completed and in operation in Covington.

Capt. J. Toujan, First Lieutenant, T. Witbeck and Second Lieutenant Oliver Montagnet, of the 10th Squadron of Cavalry, Fourth Troop, Louisiana National Guard, received their commissions last week. Further details of the organization of the troop will be given in due time.

Reletting Of Star Routes In Louisiana.

The reletting of this service for the term of four years beginning on July 1, 1906, to June 30, 1910, with the collection and distribution of mail on said routes, will close at the Department at Washington D. C., at 4:30 P. M., on Dec. 5, 1905. This is a matter of vital importance to the business interest of the public, and proposals from reliable bidders who will be expected to perform satisfactory service is desired.

Bids should be sent in sealed envelopes, superscribed "Mail Proposals, State of Louisiana," and addressed to the Second Assistant Postmaster General, Washington, D. C.

Blank proposals, printed instructions and schedules of the different routes are in the hands of the Postmasters on the routes, and will be furnished on application. This affects three routes leading out of Covington supplying intermediate offices to Alma, Lee's Creek and Madisonville.

No bids can be received for this service except from persons living on or contiguous to the route, which means persons living within the delivery of postoffices on the route. All bids must be accompanied by necessary bond, as called for by the blanks, and approved by some postmaster on the route.

Promulgation of Election.

Covington, La., Nov. 16, 1905. By virtue of the law, and in accordance with our official duty, we hereby proclaim the result of the special election held in the Town of Covington, on the 14th day of November, 1905, on the proposition of submitting to the property tax-payers of the Town of Covington the levying of a special tax, at the rate of five (5) mills on the dollar annually, for a period of ten (10) years, commencing with the year 1907, in aid of the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, the amount to be realized from said tax not to exceed the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500) in any one of said years.

Total number of votes cast in favor of the levy of said special tax, 87; total number of votes cast against the levy of said special tax, 4.

Total amount in value of property cast in favor of the levy of said special tax, \$104,670.50; total amount in value of property cast against the levy of said special tax, \$18,520.

Majority in number of property tax-payers in favor of the said levy of said special tax, 83; majority in value of property tax-payers in favor of said levy of special tax, \$86,350.

The majority in number and value of the property tax-payers of the Town of Covington, Louisiana, having voted at said special election in favor of the levy of said special tax, in aid of the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, as aforesaid, we hereby declare the said tax carried and legally adopted.
