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Bridge Contracts Awarded for Abita and Tchefuncta River Steel Bridges.

The Bridge Committee of the Police Jury met on November 20, 1905, pursuant to adjournment, to receive bids for the building of a steel bridge across the Abita River, and a steel bridge over the Tchefuncta River, near Covington. Present: Geo. Koeppe, M. C. Day, Geo. Bierhorst, and L. T. Miles.

A quorum present. The president then proceeded to open the bids, as follows: Southern Bridge Co.—For Tchefuncta bridge, steel span, \$2,825. Approaches, \$6 per lineal foot. Abita bridge, steel span, \$2,840. Approaches \$5.60 per lineal foot.

The Bullen Bridge Co.—Tchefuncta bridge, steel span, \$2,790. Approaches, \$6 per lineal foot. Abita bridge, steel span, \$2,793. Approaches, \$5.50 per lineal foot.

Texas Bridge Co.—Tchefuncta bridge, steel span, \$2,950. Approaches, \$6.60 per lineal foot. Abita bridge, steel span, 12 feet wide, \$2,385. Approaches, 12 feet wide, \$5.80 per lineal foot.

Bedell Structural Co.—Tchefuncta bridge, steel span, \$2,895. Approaches, \$6.50 per lineal foot. Abita bridge, steel span, \$2,450. Approaches \$5.55 per lineal foot.

It was moved and duly seconded that the Bullen Bridge Co., of New Orleans, being the lowest bidder, be awarded the contract for the building of both bridges.

It was moved and seconded that the Bullen Bridge Co. give a bond on the above contract in the sum of \$5,000. Carried.

It was moved and duly seconded that one-half of the contract price be paid on the receipt of steel material on the ground, and the balance on the completion and acceptance of the bridges by the Committee. Both bridges to be completed by the 1st of May, 1906. Carried.

It was moved and duly seconded that \$244.50 be paid to Alf Lacroix, balance due by the parish for the building of the approaches to Bogue Falia bridge, at Covington. Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Bierhorst, seconded by Mr. Day, that the steel bridge over the Bogue Falia, known as the Goodbee bridge, be accepted, and a warrant be drawn in favor of Geo. C. Bullen for balance due on contract for the sum of \$1,194. Carried.

On motion, duly seconded, the Committee then adjourned. GEO. KOEPP, GEO. BIERHORST, L. T. MILES, M. C. DAY, Committee.
