### South Painted Black.

New York, Nov. 29.—A special from Washington says: Southern Senators and Representatives in Congress are threatening to demand this winter a general inquiry into immigration matters. They are aroused because they feel that the South is being discriminated against in diverting immigrants to sections of the country other than the South.

Leading Southerners have long been aiming to secure more immigrants from Europe. They want such immigration to supply the demand for labor and to take up and cultivate the land. In spite of these efforts, however, it has been found that most of the Europeans arrive intending to find homes in the West or Northwest.

Investigation was made abroad by Southerners this summer. They have discovered, it is alleged, that agents of the American railroads are busy in Europe advising persons about to depart for America where they ought to go, and seeing to it that they get tickets through to their destination—generally to the West or Northwest. The agents not only overlook the South, but it is charged that pains is taken to impress immigrants with a belief that the South is settled with blacks and is a good section to avoid.

Southern agents were sent to Ellis Island to portray the advantages of the South and get immigrants diverted to their part of the country. It was discovered, it is asserted, that this was an almost hopeless task, for the reason that most of the immigrants had tickets bought abroad for points in the West or Northwest.

It is declared that the railroads have gone to this length because they want to have the lands settled in which they are interested, and which are tributary to their lines. One of the arguments which impresses itself on the intending immigrant in Europe consists in maps of the United States, with the region embracing the Southern States painted black.

It is doubtful if any legislation can be enacted that will reach such practices, but members of Congress from the South say they intend to submit the truth to both houses and demand an inquiry. They think some method may be devised to prevent what they regard as a gross injustice.

### Panned Oysters.

Put two tablespoonfuls of butter in a chafing dish or frying-pan, and melt. When it is bubbling-hot lay in twenty oysters that have been lifted from the liquor. None of the liquor should go in with them. Cook until the oysters ruffle—about three minutes. Add one-half teaspoonful of salt and a dash of cayenne pepper, squeeze in the juice of a lemon, and serve at once on hot buttered toast.


