Frisco Will Enter the City Unexpected Way.
A number of pieces of interesting information regarding the future plans of the Frisco in securing its entrance into New Orleans leaked out yesterday through a railroad man who is in close touch with the officials of that system. His story is one that has never before been mentioned, but at the same time he vouches for its accuracy. According to his statement, the Frisco is to build at once from Hope, Ark., where they have a line from the West to Alexandria, where connection will be made with the Colorado Southern, New Orleans and Pacific branch, on which trains will be taken to Baton Rouge. From that city, instead of using the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley tracks into the city, as the road has a right to do, the plan is to run over the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern branch of the Frisco to Hammond. There, according to the Picayune's informant, the New Orleans, Great Northern, or Good Year Road, will have their line meet the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern, and as soon as the connection is made the Frisco will come on into the city over the tracks of the New Orleans and Northern and the New Orleans and Northeastern, on which the Great Northern has almost a perpetual lease, finally landing in the Basin Street Station.—Picayune.

WOODCOCK IS SAFE.
Game Birds Cannot Be Killed at Any Season of the Year.
Baton Rouge, La., Dec. 22.—The effort made several days ago by Frank M. Miller, of New Orleans, President of the Audubon Society of Louisiana, to have one of the restaurants of the city raided because that restaurant was selling woodcock, has brought to light the fact that through an error in the Game Law woodcock cannot be killed at any season of the year. Act 159 of the General Assembly of 1904 defines game birds and animals and provides certain seasons in which they can be killed. Section 2 of the act makes it unlawful to catch or kill the list of birds named, except as after provided in the act. Section 5 of the act goes over the list of birds named in Section 2 and gives the closed seasons, but during the other months in the year the birds can be killed. In Section 5 there are seasons given during which the birds named in Section 2 can be killed, with the exception of the woodcock, which Section 2 provides cannot be killed, except as after provided in the act.

Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern Heading For Gulfport.
Sol. Wexler, President of the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern Railroad, and one of the directors of the Colorado Southern, is the authority for the statement that the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern will not stop at Covington, when the construction work is begun, but will build with an interruption to connect with the Gulf and Ship Island Railroad at Merrill, in order to get a line into Mobile.
The Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern, he says, will build straight to Mississippi, crossing the New Orleans and Northeastern at Nicholson and tapping the Gulf and Ship Island, which runs to Jackson, Miss., and has a deep water harbor at Gulf Port, at Merrill.
The object of the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern is to get to Mobile, in order that the road may get its part of the fruit shipments out of Mobile. Whether the road will build direct into Mobile or use the Gulf and Ship Island and the Louisville and Nashville, and have such trackage arrangements with those roads that will enable them to run through trains is not announced.

HOADLEY'S AIM
Is to Fix Stable Prices for Cotton.
Joseph H. Hoadley, leader of the bull forces in the cotton market and head of the syndicate formed to underwrite the 2,000,000 bales of cotton pledged to the Southern Cotton Grower's Association at fifteen cents, states that his aim is not so much to secure high prices, but to fix a round basis for the staple.
"The situation is no longer a speculative one," said Mr. Hoadley to-day. "It is in control of about 200,000 planters in the South. Formerly most of the cotton was held by speculators or spot people, and the farmers had to negotiate on their holdings, which made the last end of the crop vulnerable to bear attacks. There is nothing of this character to-day. I have the South with me in this movement—about 10,000,000 people—and it means a great deal of money to them. We have an option on a like amount of cotton to be planted next season, so that the farmer is assured of great prices. England must, therefore, buy the remainder of the crop from us, which would make us the biggest spot people in the business. We are not seeking higher prices so much as we are stable prices. The holding movement is so satisfactory to us that the syndicate contemplates building warehouses in the South."

Dr. Irion, the new President, comes from the extreme northwest parish of the State, up near the Arkansas-Texas line, and is from the Fourth Congressional District. Dr. Gaines is from the Fifth Congressional District and is President of the Health Board of Madison Parish. He made a heroic fight at Tallulah during the yellow fever outbreak. Dr. Perkins comes from the Seventh Congressional District and is President of the Board of Health of Lake Charles.

Should Come South in Winter.
The following is an extract from Gov. Blanchard's answer to the Commercial Club, of Salt Lake City, seeking his aid in turning summer travel to the North and West:
"Here is one thing, however, that you seem to have overlooked, and that is, that much of the travel which now goes to Europe in the spring and summer might be and could be diverted to the South, and your movement should be enlarged so as to include this latter suggestion.
"The people that run away to Italy and other countries of Southern Europe to escape the rigors of the Northern and Northwestern sections of our country might, with advantage, come to the South and winter along the shores of the Mexican Gulf and the South Atlantic. Our climate is as mild, our skies as blue, our nights as resplendent in their starlit and moonlit beauty, and our breezes from the salt seas as health giving as those to be found on the Riviera and other resorts of Southern Europe.
"I am fully in accord with you to divert this travel in summer from Europe to the Western section of our country, and I wish you to be in accord with us to divert it from Europe to the South in the winter season. Here is common ground upon which we can stand.
"Many thousands of people from the North and West of our country winter in the South now. We wish more of them to come, and no more delightful place to winter in can be found anywhere than the city of New Orleans, not to speak of the many other delightful towns to be found all over Louisiana.
"At this writing I do not know that I can attend the meeting of the conference on the 25th of January, 1906. If I find I can, I will take pleasure in doing so. In any event I will appoint two delegates at large from the State, as authorized."

Wagons, But No Dogs.
A caravan, consisting of four house-wagons and two buggies, in which ten persons, W. C. Hamp, his wife, their five sons and three daughters were making their way South, passed through Jeffersonville the other day, and attracted much attention while Hamp stopped in front of the postoffice, getting a large supply of mail that had accumulated for the family. Hamp is well off, as could be seen by the condition of his nine horses and their trappings. The wheel horse of the first wagon had a bell of peculiar tone attached to his harness. There was not a single dog in the train.
The four wagons had been converted into large one room houses, and were fitted up comfortably one of them containing an organ, on which one of the Hamp girls was playing "Rock of Ages," and singing the hymn to the musical accompaniment. This was the living room of the girls, while the father and mother and two of the younger children occupied another wagon. The remaining ones occupied the third, and the fourth was used as a kitchen and dining room. All of the rooms were equipped with stoves. Hamp for years lived near Battle Creek, Mich., and was engaged in the lumber business until a short time ago. He said he had seen the pine forests converted into building material until nothing was left but farms. Being a woodsman, he looked around for a new location and found it near Columbia, Tenn. He decided to go there, and built houses on his wagons in which to make the trip. Four weeks ago he left Battle Creek and had traveled to Jeffersonville without an accident. The family was beginning to tire and longed for Southland, which is expected to be reached within the next three weeks. He crossed the river to Louisville yesterday afternoon.
