Promulgation of Election

Covington, La., December 28, 1905. By virtue of the law, and in accordance with our official duty, we hereby promulgate the result of the special election held in the Town of Sildell, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, on the 27th day of December, 1905, on the question of submitting to the property tax-payers of said town the levy of a special tax of five mills on the dollar, per annum, on all property in said Town of Sildell, for a period of ten (10) years, for the purpose of giving additional support to the public schools in the Town of Sildell, by providing funds for the operation and equipment of a high school and for the purpose of erecting a High School and other public school buildings, etc.

Total number of votes cast in favor of the levy of said special tax, forty-four (44); total number of votes cast against the levy of said special tax, thirty-six (36).

Total amount in value of the property tax in favor of the levy of said special tax, \$74,378.00; total amount in value of property tax against the levy of said special tax, \$17,285.00.

Majority in number of property tax-payers in favor of the said levy of special tax, eight (8).

Majority in value of property tax-payers in favor of said levy of special tax, \$37,293.00.

Majority in number and value of the property tax-payers of the Town of Sildell, Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, having voted at said special election in favor of the levy of said special tax, for the purpose of additional support to public schools in the Town of Sildell, by providing funds for the operation and equipment thereof, and for the purpose of erecting a high school and other public school buildings, we hereby declare the said tax carried and legally adopted.


