State Superintendent Aswell, in his report to the Louisiana Legislature, gives a most interesting document on the progress of school work during the past two years, and makes a number of recommendations for increasing facilities and bettering the system.

According to a letter received by Director Dodeon, of the Louisiana Experiment Stations, from James Wilson, of the United States Department of Agriculture, the appropriation for the three experiment stations of Louisiana will be increased by the United States Government \$5000 this year, and this sum will be increased \$1000 a year for the next ten years, until the entire appropriation from the Federal Government is increased \$15,000, or is made double what the stations are now receiving from the Government, the sum appropriated now being \$15,000 a year. The money will be divided between the three stations. Secretary Wilson, in his letter, says that this fund, which is known as the Adams fund, as it was Representative Adams, of Wisconsin, who introduced the bill to make the increase, "must be applied only to paying the necessary expenses of conducting the original researches or experiments bearing directly on the agricultural industry."

This increase in appropriation, Director Dodeon says, will enable the experiment stations to enlarge their field of work, and give opportunity for making investigations and doing research work that will be of general benefit to the State.

The State Board of Agriculture has unanimously selected Shreveport as the site of the State fair which it is proposed to hold next fall.

The Secretary of Agriculture announces that the seed for the new cotton plant, for which applications are being received in large numbers from the South, will not be distributed this year.

Immigration League Organized.

A meeting of citizens of St. Tammany Parish was held at the Courthouse on Wednesday, April 4, for the purpose of organizing an Immigration League. Senator C. S. E. Babington called the meeting to order, at 11:30, and after stating the purpose of the proposed organization, nominated Hon. George Koopp, Jr., for President, and he was elected. Mr. John B. Kent was elected Temporary Secretary.

On motion of Mr. Clay Riggs, the following Committee on Ways and Means was appointed: C. S. E. Babington, Geo. F. Bierhorst and G. E. Millar. It was moved, seconded and carried, that the above named committee be empowered to elect a Permanent Secretary.

Hon. Clay Riggs, Mayor Galbraith, of Mandeville, and Senator Babington delivered addresses on the purposes of the League and the advantages offered by St. Tammany Parish to the homeseeker.

Improved Condition of Schools.

The report of the State Superintendent of Public Education, which is being prepared for the printer, will contain a quantity of valuable information concerning the schools of Louisiana and show a decided improvement in the condition of the schools, both financial and otherwise. Among other interesting data the report says: "The most immediate and tangible evidence of a wholesome and active educational spirit among our people is expressed in the amounts of money invested in the schools through private contributions, town council and police jury appropriations and local school taxes. During the year 1905 the police jury of the State appropriated for school purposes the sum of \$387,201.19; the amount raised by local taxation was \$161,525.39, the town councils appropriated \$60,782.43, while the sum that did not pass through the hands of the school officials, but was invested directly by the people for building and equipping school houses was \$1,325,953.66; while from the same sources in 1904 the records show \$923,304.80, the increase in local school tax alone being \$71,123.39. There are 3510 public schools in the State and 922 private schools. There are 4680 public school teachers and 1846 private school teachers, making the total number of teachers in the State 6526. The average salary of rural teachers was increased from \$36.89 to \$42.89 per month, while the average salary of city and town teachers was increased from \$45.66 to \$51.34 and the number of first grade teachers was increased from 1953 to 2920. The records of 1904 show that the amounts expended for school buildings and equipments were \$84,010.76, while in 1905 227 new school houses were built, and the sum of \$334,039.61 was expended for buildings and equipments."

Government Whitewash.

The United States Government recipe for whitewash is as follows: Slack one-half bushel of unslaked lime with boiling water, keeping it covered during the process; strain it and add a peck of salt, dissolved in warm water and boiled to a paste; one-half pound powdered Spanish whiting and a pound of clear glue, dissolved in warm water; mix these well together, and let the mixture stand for several days. Keep the wash prepared in a kettle, and when used put it on as hot as possible.

COUNCIL HALL,
 Covington, La., March 31, 1906.
 The Town Council met in regular session on the above date.

LICENSE ORDINANCE
 was then read:

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the town of Covington, La., That a license tax be and is hereby levied for the year 1906 upon each person, corporation, firm or association pursuing any calling trade, profession or doing any business in the limits of the town of Covington, La., except those who are expressly exempt from such license tax by Act 229 of the Constitution.
 Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the amount of license tax due the town of Covington for each trade, occupation, vocation, business or calling subject to license by Act 229 of the Constitution and by Act 171 of the General Assembly of 1898 shall pay in the name pro rata as the State law provides for.
 Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That the licenses due the town of Covington shall be and are hereby due and collectable at the same time and in the same manner as licenses due the State; and in the event that same are not paid when due, it is ordered that the Tax Collector for the town of Covington shall place said license tax, when due and unpaid, in the hands of the Town Attorney, who is hereby authorized and instructed to immediately thereafter institute legal proceedings to enforce the payment of same.
 It was moved and duly seconded that the above ordinance be adopted.

Yeas—Williams, Norman, Jones, Warren, Poole and Frederick.
 Nays—None.
 And the above motion was adopted.
 It was moved and duly seconded that the Town Marshall be instructed to notify all persons to screen their cisterns within ten days, as per ordinance adopted July 25, 1905, on penalty of the law. Carried.

It was moved and duly seconded that all persons who have cess pools and underground sewers be instructed to alter the same according to law. Carried.

Negro Arrested for Criminal Assault.

Last Monday a colored girl, Madeline Riggs, was criminally assaulted by a negro, Paul Payne. The girl, who is about 17 years of age, was walking along the banks of the Techeaux River, about a mile and a half north of town, when the negro sprang upon her, holding a knife in one hand and a string of fish in the other. He threatened to kill the girl unless she submitted to him quietly, and after accomplishing his purpose he ran off. The girl ran back to Fairview Farm and the Sheriff was notified of the crime. He was given a full description of the negro, and within ten minutes after getting this description Town Marshal Dulion had the negro in custody. Several other negroes were arrested on suspicion. On Tuesday the girl was taken to the jail to identify her assailant. She was shown the knife which had been taken from one of the negroes and identified it as the one with which her assailant had threatened her. Fifteen or more negroes were then lined up, and she immediately picked out Payne. The proper charge has been made against him and he will be held for the Grand Jury.
