The date of the Democratic primary election in the Sixth Congressional District of Louisiana was changed from September 11 to September 6. Provision was also made by the Democratic Executive Committee for the nomination of a member of the State Board of Equalization.

A large quantity of material is on the ground, and work will be pushed as rapidly as possible.

The New Orleans Liederkreis came over last Sunday and spent the day the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Portune, in Claiborne, the train stopping there to let them off. They were given a fine reception, lunch being served at 11 a. m., and an elaborate dinner at 4 p. m. With vocal and instrumental music, dancing, etc., all had a most enjoyable time, and left on the evening train, highly delighted with their visit.

The Board of Trustees of the Covington High School has organized by electing Hon. J. S. Jones President and E. J. Frederick Secretary and Treasurer. The other members of the Board are: Hon. C. V. Quave, E. J. Domingue and J. E. Smith. The Board has instructed the Parish Superintendent to procure a first-class man as principal, and to negotiate for sufficient new seats to fit up the new rooms. The Board is also pushing petitions for a 4-mill tax for ten years, with which to build a \$25,000 school building and to maintain a first-class High School here.

Col. J. C. Monroze, of the State Pension Board, stated that the Board of Pensions will meet in Baton Rouge September 25 and take up the large amount of accumulated business which is awaiting the attention of the Board. The doubling of the appropriation for pensions will be a large number of applications that have been hanging over for several years. The work of the Secretary of the Board will be virtually doubled, and the work of the Board in passing on the accumulated number of applications will be arduous, unless steps are taken to facilitate the work by weeding out the more unworthy of these prior to the meeting of the Board. At best, the Board will be in session for a long time attending to the routine business requiring its attention at the coming meeting.
