The special election for a 4 mill school tax will be held on Monday, October 15, and from what we can learn, it will be carried by a large majority.

The annual Methodist camp meeting at Tallahassee closed last Sunday night, after a very successful session of ten days, considering the inclement weather.

There has been a sharp advance in the prices of cotton, lumber and turpentine, as a result of the havoc done by the storm of last week.

New Orleans Great Northern.

Construction work is being steadily pushed on the New Orleans Great Northern road, better known as the Goodyear system, from Slidell to Jackson, Miss., and trains will be in operation on the division from Slidell to Monticello, Miss., within the next ninety days.

President Goodyear, of Buffalo, N. Y., will visit the State this month for the purpose of conferring with General Manager Pearsall and his other associates in the work. As a result of this visit, it is expected that orders will be issued for the commencement of grading work southward, from Jackson to Monticello, in order to get the entire system completed by the middle of next year.

Charles A. Heintz.

Last Saturday our community was pained to hear of the death of Charles A. Heintz, although it was not entirely unexpected, as he had been in feeble health for some time. In his death, our town has lost one of its oldest citizens; a man who was favorably known and highly esteemed throughout St. Tammany and Washington parishes. He was a man of more than ordinary intelligence, and his genial disposition endeared him to all, especially to those who knew him best. He will long be missed throughout the community, and his bereaved family have universal sympathy in their affliction.

The funeral took place Sunday afternoon from his late residence in Boston Street and was one of the largest in recent years. The body was laid to rest in the family plot of the Covington Cemetery by Rev. T. M. Suley, Pastor of the Methodist Church, assisted by the lodges of Masons, Knights of Pythias and Druids of which he was an active member. Mr. Heintz was born in Germany seventy six years ago, and for fifty years has been a resident merchant here. He was an uncle of Mayor F. Julius Heintz, of Abita Springs, and a brother of Rev. L. Heintz, who was for years pastor of the German Lutheran Church in Jackson Avenue, in New Orleans, and of Mrs. Amelia Delcourt, of Hamilton, Ohio, and had just returned from a visit to her when he was taken sick. Mr. Heintz was twice married, first to Miss Sophy Moultry, of New Orleans, and later in 1870 to Miss Juliet Bruce, of the same place, who survives him. As a result of these unions, he leaves five sons—Charles, Louis, Julius, Emile and George, and four daughters, Emma and Eugenie Heintz, Mrs. L. Levy and Mrs. L. M. Dempree. For years he took an active part in public affairs, having served the town as Mayor, Councilman and Postmaster, at various times. The latter office he held for ten years, from 1884 to 1894. He was also an active member of all the local lodges, being at the time of his death Secretary of the Masonic Lodge and also of the Knights of Pythias, of which he was a charter member. For years he has represented these lodges in the Grand Lodge. He was also a member of Bogus Falaya Grove of Druids, and a member of the Council of that order. For several years his health had not been good, but he was about his store up to a few days ago, when he was taken sick and confined to his bed.

Examination of Teachers

In the special September examinations of public school teachers, several teachers who have come to St. Tammany Parish from other States took advantage of the opportunity to qualify according to the State law, and several of the most prominent teachers of the parish took the examinations to renew their certificates. But one person got as low as a third grade certificate, and all the others, with the exception of two who failed to pass, attained a percentage of over 90 in the examination. Prof. J. F. Peters, Principal of the Mandeville High School, scored 99.2 per cent. and then had fifteen credits from his attendance on the Summer Normal School. Prof. W. V. Fenton, Principal of the Slidell High School, who had just returned from his summer vacation, and who was rushed into his examination without previous notice, got 90.8 per cent. Mrs. M. H. Hughes got 92, Miss S. L. Hughes 96 and Miss Mattie J. Self 90. All three of these ladies are of the Faculty of the Slidell school, and had not thought of taking the examination until December, when a few days before the time notice of the opportunity to renew their certificates was given. Miss Lucy W. Perkins, who has charge of the Lewisburg school, attained a first-grade certificate, with 93 per cent to her credit. The lady obtaining a third-grade certificate was Miss Pearl Howe, of Carrere, Miss. Miss Howe has taught several years in this parish in ungraded schools, and has always given satisfaction.

The Ben Williams Graded School, in the Fifth Ward, opened Monday, October 1, with Prof. M. C. Sylvest as Principal, and Miss Pearl Howe as assistant. Prof. H. E. W. Jones, of Arlington, Tenn., who was elected Principal of this school, resigned last week to accept the principalship of a school at Clarksville, Tenn. Prof. Sylvest taught the past session in the Fenelon school, in this parish, with fine success.
