Following is an extract from a speech delivered by Benjamin T. Waido, President of the New Orleans Poll Tax Association: "The man who does not pay his poll tax is a more serious menace to the city and the State than the anarchist or the professional agitator. The lack of interest in politics on the part of the average young American constitutes a greater danger to the Republic than even the influence of the money power. If Americans would devote a tenth of the time to a study of their country's needs, that they do to golf, to baseball or to auto cars, there would be no such spectacle presented as that of a United States Senator posing as a tribune of the people at home and accepting the bounty of the Standard Oil Company in Washington." What applies to New Orleans applies to St. Tammany Parish and Covington. Pay your poll tax now.
