Fireworks Ordinance.

Now that the holiday season is near at hand, we publish the following ordinance, adopted Dec. 7, 1897, for the information of the public:

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Covington, Louisiana, that the discharge of firecrackers, skyrocket, or fireworks of any description, is hereby prohibited within the limits of Florida, New Hampshire, Rutland and Gibson streets. All persons violating the provisions of this ordinance, on conviction before the Mayor, shall be fined not exceeding five dollars, or imprisoned five days in jail, at the discretion of the Mayor.

Fire in Franklinton.
Fire broke out in the block just south of the new Bank of Franklinton, opposite courthouse square, about 1:30 last Friday morning, and destroyed the entire block, with the exception of the new bank, which is a concrete building and escaped without damage. The fire was discovered about the center of the block and is said to have started in the rear of Dr. Jones' office, where a lot of medicine and chemicals were kept. Although happening at that early hour in the morning, it was probably of incendiary origin or the result of the promiscuous discharge of fireworks by a crowd of boys about town at a late hour of the night.
Those put out of business by the fire are: D. B. Walker, barber, loss about \$150; Drs. Jones & Greenlaw's office, \$500; G. W. Goodby, law office and library, \$250; O. E. Simmons, grocery, \$500; William Wood, butcher, \$200; D. A. Self & Co., about \$1500. Self & Co. had a large stock of general merchandise, a considerable amount of which was saved. The U. S. postoffice was also in the building occupied by Self & Co., but most of the contents was also saved. All of the

buildings were entirely destroyed. The building and warehouse occupied by Self & Co. was owned by R. D. Magee, valued at \$1500, with no insurance.
Mrs. Emily Wood's residence, adjoining Self & Co. was also completely destroyed; \$600 insurance. The home of Mr. William Mueckler was saved by the great effort by Rev. W. R. Harwell and others.
