Accidental Drowning.

Sixth Ward, St. Tammany Parish, Near Pearl River, La., January 10, 1907. Dear Sir—A sad accident has occurred in the east end of this ward, that never before has it been so upset. It seems that Maurice Crawford, aged 38, white, was a sufferer from epileptic fits. He went to visit his brother, Edward's, camp at head of Big Broad River, on New Year's Day. While there, he was seized with a fit, and recovering started home about moon setting, telling his brother the route he would take through the swamp. That evening his brother returned home, and not finding Maurice gave the alarm. Search was instituted at once with torches and lanterns, and carried on far into the night, without result. At daybreak the next day it was resumed. All the industries shut down, and every man in the settlement, as well as some from Honey Island and Bayou LaCombe, assisted in the search.

Dynamite was procured and used in the river, through and deep holes in the swamp. Drags were made and used in the waters. Boats searched the rivers, and lines of men swept the swamps, hammocks, and even the "pine woods," in their fruitless search for the missing man. No rumor was advanced but that someone was immediately in the saddle, on his way to investigate.

The search was continued day and night for two days, and on Sunday evening the well-nigh exhausted searchers decided to return to their homes. One incident, however, kept spurring some on in their search. When Maurice left home he was accompanied by a half-breed collie dog, and a half hour after he left his brother's camp the dog returned to the camp alone, and all the while the search was going on it would repeatedly return to the river and scent over the water, as though seeking its lost master.

On this basis, the search was continued day and night on the river, and on Tuesday morning, January 8, 1907, two of the searchers, Messrs. J. M. and George Oberer, were rewarded by finding the missing man floating in the river a short distance below where the dog returned to the water. The finding of the body was a great relief to his aged and heartbroken parents.

Upon authority from the Coroner, Justice of the Peace Mr. John Hager selected a jury, who decided that Maurice Crawford came to his death from accidental drowning.

His remains were laid to rest at Hickory Creek Cemetery, near Andabon, La., funeral services being conducted by Rev. John Harper.

In this connection, the parents and brothers and sisters of the deceased wish to express their heartfelt thanks and gratitude to both friend and stranger alike for their untiring efforts in seeking their lost boy and brother. D.

New Railways in Louisiana.

Louisiana ranks second among the States of the Union in the new railroad mileage laid in 1906; and, taking the last three years, it still holds second place. This is the more surprising because the State is not a newly opened one, with a sparse population, as is the case with South Dakota, which ranks next to it in new trackage. Louisiana is an old and well settled State, and there could be no better proof of the business and commercial development under way than is to be found in the heavy work of railroad construction. The additional mileage is being built because the commercial needs of Louisiana require it.

To those who knew the railroad geography of Louisiana of a few years ago, a list of the lines under construction to-day is almost incomprehensible; so many are the new roads being built into the State. Those adding to the mileage in 1906 number no less than twenty. The New Orleans Great Northern leads in mileage, as was expected. The Louisiana Railway and Navigation Company, the old New Orleans and Red River Valley, is second in the completion of its line to New Orleans. Then follow the Colorado and Southern, the Jasper and Eastern, the Arkansas Southern, the Kansas City Southern, the Louisiana and Arkansas, the Louisiana East and West, the Opelousas Gulf and Northeastern, and a half-dozen others. The new mileage constitutes only a fraction of what it is proposed to build, and this assures continued construction for many years to come, until all these lines and their connections are completed, so that there is no probability of any let-up in the present activity. When the work is all complete it will call for a new map of the State, for nothing tears up a country more than railroad building, establishing new towns and changing the names of old ones, until a former resident would scarcely know the country again.

For the State as a whole this railroad construction means, of course, new facilities for the shipment of produce to market and the more rapid development of its great resources.

The South's Imperial Crop.

Over \$2,000,000,000 is invested in cotton mills in Europe and America dependent upon the South for their raw material. It is estimated that 10,000,000 people in Great Britain alone live on the cotton industry of that country. The balance of trade in favor of the United States depends upon our cotton exports, which now annually reach \$400,000,000, or more than the world's gold production. Of this royal crop, imperial in magnitude and in domination of the world's financial and manufacturing interests, the South holds a world-monopoly. Its ability to increase cotton production to meet the world's growing needs, and its ability to develop cotton manufacturing commensurate with its monopoly of cotton production, is limited only by its labor supply. Economic forces will of necessity bring about a great increase in population, and thus prepare the way for a vast expansion in manufacturing and in production, as the price and demand may justify. The South produces 80 per cent of the cotton for the 119,000,000 spindles in the world, but has less than 10,000,000 spindles itself. Think of the limitless possibilities for expansion in this industry alone, when you are studying the future of the South.—Manufacturers' Record.

Box Rent Rates.

Heretofore rates governing the rental of postoffice boxes were fixed upon no established basis, with the result that at certain large postoffices rates were lower than at many small offices; the charge for small boxes was in many cases higher than that which should have been made for large boxes; rent was sometimes collected at the same rate for boxes of all sizes; and at postoffices of like class in the same vicinity, equipped with similar boxes, rents were collected at widely different rates. In order to remedy these conditions and provide a definite and satisfactory rule for the collection of box rents, a schedule based upon the kind and capacity of boxes and gross receipts at various postoffices was placed in effect January 1, 1907, and will be strictly adhered to hereafter. The schedule fixes the rates for boxes at the local post office, where the annual gross receipts are more than \$5000 and less than \$10,000, as follows: Small call boxes, per quarter, 25 cents; small lock drawers, 45 cents; large lock drawers, 75 cents.

In this connection the following information regarding the manner of collecting box rents will prove of general interest: "Box rents must be collected at the beginning of each quarter for the entire quarter, but no longer. Five days before the last day of each quarter postmasters are required to place a bill bearing the date of the last day of the quarter in each rented box. If a holder fails to renew his right to the box on or before the last day of the quarter the box shall then be closed and offered for rent, and the mail will be placed in the general delivery."

CHARTER OF THE Madisonville Supply Company, LIMITED. United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

BE IT KNOWN, That on this twenty-eighth day of the month of December, in the year our lord one thousand, nine hundred and six, before me, Benjamin M. Miller, a notary public, duly commissioned, qualified and sworn, and for the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and in the presence of witnesses, personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, as they are hereunto subscribed, and they declared that they do hereby form and organize themselves into a corporation for a term of fifty (50) years, from this date, under the name of the "MADISONVILLE SUPPLY COMPANY, LIMITED," the domicile whereof is hereby fixed in the Parish of Madisonville, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana; and the objects and purposes and business for which the corporation is organized, and the nature of the business to be carried on by it, are declared to be the retail merchandise and liquor business, both for cash and credit; also a brokerage and commission business; to import and export; to buy and sell on commission merchandise, grain, produce, machinery, wagons, buggies and all other commodities that are or may be handled in the course of trade. They shall also be vested with all the power and authority conferred by law on like corporations, as they specially herein enumerated. Citation shall be served on the President, or in his absence on the Vice President of the corporation.

The capital stock shall be five thousand dollars (\$5,000) divided into five hundred (500) shares of the sum of ten dollars (\$10) each, which said stock shall be paid for in cash at the time of subscription, or may be issued, at not less than par, in payment or exchange for property or rights actually received or purchased by said corporation, or the same may be issued full paid for money advanced and for services or other valuable consideration.

The affairs of said corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors composed of seven stockholders, to be elected by the stockholders annually, by ballot, on the 4th day of December, or any subsequent day fixed by the Board in case of non-election having taken place on said date. Each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote. Said Board shall have the right to make all by-laws and change and alter the same at pleasure.

Any stockholder may sell, assign or transfer his stock in this corporation, provided thirty days notice of such intention to sell, assign or transfer the same be given to the company, and the other stockholders thereof shall have the first privilege of purchasing same, at book value, after which thirty days notice the same stock may be sold in open market.

The said corporation shall begin business as soon as twenty per cent of its capital stock shall have been subscribed.
