Who is Knocking?

LOST OUT. The fearful and awful conditions of our streets, ditches and cesspools, making the sanitary conditions so dangerous—being threatened with typhoid and other contagious diseases from the uncleanness of the town—so disgusted Dr. E. L. McGhee of New Orleans, who contemplated locating a sanitarium here, that he has gone to Hammond, and will locate his institution there, where the people are awake to their own self preservation, both from a business and health standpoint.

Can't and won't our doctors take the matter up with our town council, and try to wake them up to a realization of our constant loss—Covington News.

The above article is a gross misrepresentation, misleading and hurtful to the interests of our town, and to as far as possible undo its evil effects, we herewith publish the following letter from Dr. McGhee, of date January 29, 1907: NEW ORLEANS, LA., Jan. 29, 1907. Dr. C. Z. Williams, Covington, La.: Dear Doctor—An article appeared in your local paper [the News] last week, titled "Lost Out," stating that I had adversely criticized the sanitary conditions of your streets, and because of the said unsanitary conditions I had located a Sanitarium in Hammond, rather than in Covington. Such statements have no foundation (except in a conversation about the value of municipal sanitation in Covington) for I know nothing about the condition of the streets. I have never had a word to say about the condition of your streets. My sons located "Hammond Sanitarium" in that city because of railroad facilities, and because of a deep well that supplies remarkably pure water; and further, because of the fact that the topography of Hammond is similar to that of Covington. Though we knew of the salubrity of your climate, we did not once think of locating the Sanitarium in Covington, for you are well supplied with such institutions. I thank you for directing my attention to the clipping in Justice to Covington and myself, please ask the local paper to publish this note, and oblige.

The funeral took place Monday evening, Rev. T. M. Buley officiating. He was buried with the honors of the Druids, and the Woodmen of the World attended the funeral in a body.
