Military Ball and Competitive Drill.

The military ball and competitive drill given by the Fourth Troop of Cavalry, L. S. N. G., at Poole's Skating Rink, last Monday night, was a grand success, both socially and financially. There was a large attendance from Covington and other points, and all enjoyed the drill and the dancing that followed, which was continued till a late hour.

The competitors in the drill were composed of picked squads of the Troopers and Cadets, the latter being the first to enter the contest, fourteen in number, seven each from Companies A and B.

Capt. McCallan, of Company B, put the Cadets through a severe test, which resulted in a victory for Corporal Frank Kilpatrick, of Company B, who won the gold medal for being the best drilled Cadet.

The judges in this contest were First Lieutenant J. F. Diendorf and Second Lieutenant Ed. Evans, of the Fourth Troop of Cavalry.

The sabre contest between members of the Cavalry Troop followed, under command of Capt. James A. Alpuente, who put the squad to a severe test, the victor and winner of the gold medal being Sergt. Reiz Alpuente, who successfully retired all competitors. The judges in this contest were Captain E. G. Hardin and C. C. Morris.

At the close of the drill the competitors were drawn up in line, and the handsome medals were delivered to the winners by Adjutant Reht. Lobdell, in a few well chosen remarks, which were greeted by continued applause.

Refreshments and dancing followed, the music being furnished by the Mandeville Brass Band.

The Troopers and Cadets were well up in the manual of arms and displayed remarkable efficiency, the contest being narrowed down to a strict attention to orders, the defeated ones being caught entirely by a lapse of attention, rather than deficiency in handling their weapons. The winners deserve great credit for their success, but all contestants displayed an aptness and knowledge of the manual which presages wonderful results and a fine record for them in case their services are ever needed in the ranks of actual warfare.
