During the past two or three weeks the attitude of the Protestant Ministers to high license has been in question and frequently maliciously commented upon. We take it that this is due to the peculiar conditions existing in town on the eve of an election.

Some six weeks ago an organization known as the High License League was formed, and with others the Protestant Ministers took an active part in its formation, and also in the enlistment of many of its members. It so happened that some of the prime movers of the High License League were actively engaged at the same time in politics of the municipality, and through no effort or disposition on their part their political efforts were attributed to the High License League, and particularly to the ministers.

This condition was the mistake of no person in particular, but a misfortune for the ministers, and at a special meeting, all members present, the Protestant Ministers Association decided to have their attitude understood. We stand for High License and our efforts will be to this end, and the means on hand will be used only in so far as our work as ministers will justify. We are loyal to the High License League, loyal to the spirit of its charter, loyal to the moral interests of the people and will ever lend our aid to the general good of the town.
