First Bale of Cotton.

The first bale of cotton for St. Tammany Parish was brought in from the Second Ward Tuesday, August 20, by Mr. Albert Burnthorn. It weighed 465 pounds and was purchased by J. C. Burns & Co. for 12.30, and a premium of one barrel of Obelisk flour. It was shipped to W. B. Thomson & Co., of New Orleans. The season here is about the same as last year. It is thought that the crop will be one of the largest raised in this section in years.

The New Orleans Great Northern.

General Manager N. G. Pearsall of the New Orleans Great Northern said Monday that another section of the main line will be placed in operation about September 15. This additional trackage will place the New Orleans Great Northern trains in operation as far north from New Orleans as Columbia Junction or West Columbia, as it will probably be called after the railroad makes its entrance. Following this extension of the service northward from New Orleans, it is unlikely that another section north from Columbia will be put in operation from New Orleans until after the completion of the line, about sixty days from now, when there will be a continuous track from New Orleans to Jackson, Miss. On account of the necessity of finishing up the road bed and putting on the last touches, it is probable that through service between New Orleans and Jackson, Miss., may not be realized until January 1. At the present time, Mr. Pearsall says, the work of construction is being carried on in three places north and south from Montuocelo, and on the south end of the line below Red Bluffs. The present plan is to connect the line through the Bluffs after the remainder is constructed, it being necessary to remove about 85,000 cubic yards of dirt to the mile for four miles through the Red Bluffs in order to maintain the New Orleans Great Northern's grade of three-tenths of one per cent.

Mr. Pearsall expects to have the shore line which the company is building between Slidell and Mandeville completed by Oct. 1.
