COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Council Hall,
Covington, La., Sept. 3, 1907.
The council met in regular ses-
sion on the above date.
Present—C. Z. Williams, Mayor;
S. D. Bulloch, M. P. Planche, J.
S. Jones, Preston Burns, W. R.
Badon.

Absent—E. J. Frederick.
The reading of the minutes of
the last meeting was dispensed
with.

The following petition was then read:
PETITION.

Covington, La., Sept. 3rd 1907.
To the Hon. Mayor and Council of
Covington, La.
We, the undersigned, constituting
one-third in number and amount of the
property tax payers of the town of
Covington, Louisiana, entitled to vote
on the subject matter hereinafter set
forth respectfully petition your Honor-
able Body to order a special election
for the purpose of submitting to the
vote of the property tax payers of the
town of Covington, Louisiana, a propo-
sition to levy and assess special taxes
upon all the property within said town
subject to State taxation at the rate of
three mills on the dollar of the assessed
valuation for each year for twenty-
five years, commencing with and in-
cluding the year of 1908, said special
taxes so voted to be used solely and ex-
clusively for the purpose of purchasing
any existing system of waterworks, or
purchasing or constructing a system of
water works for the use and benefit of
the town of Covington, Louisiana, the
title to which shall be and remain in
the town of Covington, Louisiana, and
to incur debt and issue negotiable
bonds for said purpose, said bonds not
to exceed Forty thousand (\$40,000.00)
Dollars in amount and to bear interest
at the rate of five per cent. per annum,
and to be payable not more than twenty-
five years from January 1st, 1909.
The principal and interest of said
bonds to be paid out of the proceeds of
the special taxes as directed hereafter
by the appropriate ordinance of the
town Council of Covington, Louisiana,
and in accordance with the Constitu-
tion and laws of the State of Louisiana.

Respectfully,
Signed by 126 tax payers.
It was moved and duly seconded that
a committee be appointed to compare
the list of signers with the assessment
rolls and list of registered voters. Car-
ried.

The Mayor appointed on said com-
mittee Messrs. E. J. Frederick,
J. S. Jones and Preston Burns.
It was moved and duly seconded that
the town attorney be and is hereby in-
structed to make a demand on Mr. L.
Wehrli, for building banquet on Lock-
wood and New Hampshire Sts., and
also on the estate of Mr. J. R. Cahier
for building banquet on Boston St., and
in event of failure to collect for same
to enter suit at once. Carried.

It was moved and duly seconded that
all peddlers, peddling in the town of
Covington, anything other than what
they actually raise, be made to pay a
license, and the marshal is instructed
to collect the same. Carried.

It was moved and duly seconded
that all boot blacks doing business in
the town of Covington be made pay a
license and the marshal is instructed
to collect the same. Carried.

On motion of Mr. Jones duly second-
ed by Mr. Burns the following resolu-
tion and ordinance was adopted.
Resolved that the Southern Hotel
Co., Ltd., of Covington, Louisiana, be
and is hereby granted the right and
privilege of constructing, maintaining
and operating a sewer pipe along New
Hampshire and Asia Streets from the
Southern Hotel building to the Bogue
Falls River, for the purpose of con-
veying the sewerage from said Hotel
building and premises to said river, the
said sewer pipe to be of sizes and to be
placed as shown on the plan made by
Preston Herndup, Civil Engineer, on file
and attached hereto. The same to be
placed at least three feet from the
edge of the gutter, but should said
sewer pipe interfere with the construc-
tion of any public improvement, the
title to which vests in the Town of
Covington, then, and in that event the
same shall be removed at the expense
of the said Southern Hotel Co., Ltd.

The franchise and privilege to be for
the sole use of said Southern Hotel.
The following ordinance was then
read.

ORDINANCE.
Be It Ordained by the Town Council of
the Town of Covington, in legal session convened,
that that portion of Kemper Street, in said
town, commencing at a point sixty feet
southeast from the corner of Kemper and Bul-
loch Streets, thence along said Kemper Street
to the Bogue Falaya River, be and the same is
hereby declared vacated and closed.
Sec. 1. Be It Further Ordained, That this
Ordinance shall take effect from and after its
passage.
It was moved and seconded that the
above ordinance be adopted. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the
Mayor be authorized to sign the lease
of the above vacated street, to Mr. E.
L. Charroppin, in consideration of
which the town is to receive his park,
as per agreement. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that E.
D. Kentzel be appointed as secretary
pro tem with authority to sign warrants
Carried.





