Father Kilian Gessner.

Saturday, September 7, 1907, Father Kilian Gessner died at St. Joseph's Abbey from the effect of a stroke of apoplexy received several days previously.

Father Gessner was a native of Wurtzenburg, Bavaria, where he was born in 1838. Interment took place in the cemetery of the Order at the College, and was attended by all the students and teachers.

Father Gessner, was a much-loved and useful member of the Benedictine order, which he entered in 1882, at St. Menard Seminary and Abbey, in Indiana, coming to Louisiana fifteen years ago at the solicitation of Archbishop Jansens, and assisted in the establishment of St. Joseph's College, in this parish, in which he was much interested.

Father Gessner was a native of Wurtzenburg, Bavaria, where he was born in 1838. Interment took place in the cemetery of the Order at College, and was attended by all the teachers and pupils of that institution.

A Spangyan Explosion.

Cheboygan, Mich., Sept. 1.—Mrs. Fred Williams, living near Boar Point, on Crooked Lake, near this city, was severely injured and her seven year old son was probably fatally hurt, when a dynamite cap in the boy's hip pocket exploded while the mother was spanking him for a minor offense. The boy had been out in the field where his father was using dynamite to blow up stumps and had slipped one of the percussion caps which Mr. Williams was using in his pocket. He later returned to the house where his mother called him in to be punished for some childish offense. Mrs. Williams used a single as the instrument of punishment. The first blow exploded the cap in the boy's pocket and the explosion tore a large hole in his hip, from which he is believed to be dying. The mother lost two fingers, and received a number of cuts about her face and body.
