The Branch of the St. Tammany Banking Co. and Savings Bank at Mandeville, La., was destroyed by fire on Friday night, Sept. 13, 1907, at 11 p. m. The fire originated in the postoffice next door. The building in which the bank was located was owned by D. A. Depre, and was burned to the ground. The bank, however, opened for business the following morning at the usual hour in the store of A. G. Depre. The vault was opened at about 11 a. m. that morning and the money, paper and books of the bank were found to be intact, not even scorched.

The loss to the bank will not exceed \$200. The bank immediately determined upon the erection of a modern, fireproof bank and office building. They have already purchased a lot at the corner of Carroll and Claiborne streets, which is centrally located, and they hope to be in their new quarters by Jan. 1. In the mean time, the bank will be run in the store recently vacated by A. G. Vix.
