school house, in the town of Covington,

special election held in the said town

Council Meeting.

Following is a condensed report
of the proceedings of the Town
Council at meeting of Tuesday and
Wednesday October 1 and 2, the
crowded condition of the paper
making it necessary to postpone
publication in full till next week.

A number of bills were approved.

The Marshal's report was read,
showing collections for the month
of September, \$736.28.

Treasurer's report was read,
showing amount on hand Sept. 30,
\$3,355.

Twenty-five dollars was appropri-
ated towards building bridge across
Simpsons Branch, on 21st Ave.

Signs for street corners were or-
dered to be purchased.

A petition for a new bridge and
an electric light on or near same,
across Simpson's Branch, on Madis-
sonville road, was read, and the
Council instructed the Improvement
Committee to have the same bridge
fixed at both ends, and the electric
light proposition was tabled.

Thirty-five dollars per month was
appropriated for public school.

The Committee appointed on un-
completed school building assessed
the value of work done and mate-
rial on the grounds, at \$17,740.96
less \$250 for defect, which was
paid in certificates of indebtedness
at 10 per cent discount.
