Saturday Excursions.

There has been considerable complaint that the Saturday excursions out of Covington have taken a great deal of trade to New Orleans that rightfully belongs to the merchants of Covington, and this is probably true. The railroad cannot be blamed for this. It is conducting its business to make money, and if it did not look out for its own interests no one else would; besides, they are a great convenience to the public.

But we do not think it politic, nor to the best interest individually or collectively, for the sake of a few pennies saved, to transfer to New Orleans or to other cities the patronage that rightfully belongs to our home merchants. We should have civic pride enough to cast aside such trivial considerations for the mutual gain that demands the sacrifice of personal interests to the welfare of the community. Upon the success of our businessmen depends the prosperity of the town, and incidentally your own prosperity, and by your non-support of community interests in withdrawing your aid and assistance from the home merchant, you are simply placing obstacles in the way of an ultimate condition that would enable you to purchase in your home market at as reasonable figures, quality for quality, as you could in New Orleans.

Think this over; and remember that the money you spend here goes into circulation. It enables somebody who owes you to pay the debt, and it enables you to pay the debt you owe. It brings comfort and the necessities of life to those who are near and dear to you; but the money you take away may be a long time coming back, and perhaps never. Help to build up your home merchant and enable him, by his increased business, to meet your demands. In strenuous times, when credit is needed, the New Orleans merchant is not the one who is going to carry you over the rough places. It is your home merchant.

President Roosevelt, in his proclamation, fixes the last Thursday in November, the 28th, as Thanksgiving Day, and says: "During the past year we have been free from famine, from pestilence, from war. We are at peace with all the rest of mankind. Our natural resources are at least as great as those of any other nation. We believe that in ability to develop and take advantage of these resources the average man of this nation stands at least as high as the average man of any other. Nowhere else in the world is there such an opportunity for a free people to develop to the fullest extent all its powers of body, of mind, and of that which stands above both body and mind—character."

It is noticeable that many who formerly cultivated small farms of their own in this parish, or who worked as farm hands for others, have abandoned this work for employment in the numerous small saw mills scattered throughout the parish. This abandonment will be only temporary—the result of peculiar conditions that have kept cash out of the hands of the farmer and substituted a necessity for barter and trade; but as land values increase, so will the value of the products of the soil and the demand for them. New railroads and new development will create a demand for such products as can be profitably raised in St. Tammany parish, and the scramble to secure lands will be as eager then as the desire for new employment is now.

Diseases are combated and remedies found for them when they become alarmingly prevalent and dangerous; but these recurring panics at an almost uniform period of twenty years seem to defy all effort to counteract their fearful and devastating influences. We are told that "neither the business credit of the nation nor its industrial and agricultural prosperity is affected"—in other words, that there is no cause for alarm. It seems, under such circumstance, that a homeopathic dose of confidence should be all that is necessary; yet the most drastic measures prove ineffective. Let us hope that the "elastic currency" prescription may prove beneficial in future outbreaks, if it only can be properly compounded.

Judge Peterson has the position of justice of the peace, in Slidell, vice Judge Quinlan, resigned.

The indications are that Jared Y. Sanders is so far in the lead that there will be no catching up with him, by other candidates.

There is talk about the need of a more elastic currency. Perhaps another issue is to be injected into the coming presidential campaign.

In supplementing the call for an extra session, it looks as if Acting Governor Sanders was "heaping coals of fire" upon the head of Governor Blanchard.

We know that money is close and that there is need for it all; but at the same time there is some appreciation due to the efforts being made by the Ladies Auxiliary. Try to aid them in any way you can.

It is a satisfaction to know, in these troublous times, that our little banks in St. Tammany parish, with their investments in solid, actual values, are not in danger of collapse from shrinkage of securities through speculative influences.

What a remarkable show of confidence it was that induced the patrons of the Trust Company of America to deposit one million dollars over the counter in a single morning in New York City, while crowds were demanding their money.

Previous to the arrival of Mr. Cusachs, chairman of the Parish Executive Committee, last Saturday, there was some excitement among several candidates who had failed to deposit their assessments for primary expenses. But "all's well that ends well."

Mayor Berman has shown great executive ability in his handling of the levy strike in New Orleans, and to his discretion is largely due the fact that there has been a peaceful termination of the trouble and that shipping operations are no longer tied up by labor strife. This means a new impetus to business at a time when "every little bit helps."

Bryan says that Roosevelt is not responsible for the recent flurry in financial circles. This seems self-evident (considering we are on the eve of a presidential election) in view of the fact that it is conceded we are as prosperous as could be expected, if people would only not get excited. As for Louisiana, the sugar and cotton crops are abundant, labor is well paid, the strike on the levy over—and Christmas is coming.

The manufacturing lumbermen of Houston, Texas, have called a meeting for November 9, to devise ways and means of utilizing the waste around saw mills.

It is surprising what a condition of wastefulness exists in this connection, when we consider the value of lumber. Anyone inspecting the numerous small saw mills in St. Tammany parish will note at a glance that this unnecessary loss of timber would reach figures of surprising magnitude if calculated upon a basis of actual waste, but like the by-products of the cotton oil industry, the usefulness of what is now discarded as worthless will only become known when a value is placed upon it by showing its fitness to be manufactured into useful products. It is to be hoped that this meeting will be productive of results that may be of benefit to us here by way of example.

The Extra Session.

The following letter is taken from the Picayune: New Orleans, Oct. 27, 1907.

Editor Picayune—Relative to the Governor's Precipitate call for an extra session of the General Assembly, we are at a loss to know why he did not urge these measures at the last two regular sessions of the General Assembly. The measures which he urges as an excuse for this extraordinary call have been before the people for the last four years, most of which were made an issue in the last campaign, and notwithstanding the large vote recorded in their favor, he has allowed his administration to come almost to a close before raising his voice in their behalf. He had ample opportunity at the last session of the General Assembly to have had all these measures embodied into law. But having failed to do his duty, he now comes forward on the verge of an election as the champion of reforms which he has persistently opposed.

The Constitution says: Article 75, he (the Governor) may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the General Assembly at the seat of government. Where was the "extraordinary occasion" for this call? Why put the State to the expense of convening the General Assembly to pass laws which they should have passed at the session one year ago, or could pass at the regular session five months from now? What is the "method" in this "madness?" "Verily, his ways are past finding out."

How is he to interfere with candidates that are now in the field? The last Legislature passed the Primary Law. It is a State Law. Candidates have made their deposits under this law, which is a contract between them and the State, and this action of the Governor can be viewed in no other light than to impair the obligation of contract.

The above letter appears to us a very just criticism of the action of Governor Blanchard in delaying until the eve of his retirement matters that should have been attended to in the early part of his administration. It gives his call for an extra session the appearance of desiring to withdraw Mr. Sanders from the field of campaign.

CHARTER

OF THE Covington Steam Laundry Co.

United States of America. State of Louisiana. Parish of St. Tammany.

BET KNOWN, That, on this 13th day of September, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and thirty second:

Before me, Edward H. Richard, a Notary Public, in and for the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and duly commissioned and qualified, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, Personally came and appeared, the parties whose names are hereunto subscribed, all of full age, who declare that, availing themselves of the provisions of the laws which confer authority to exist and enjoy succession for the full term and period of ninety-nine years from date hereof, unless sooner dissolved:

The name and style of this corporation shall be the "Covington Steam Laundry Company," and by that name it shall have perpetual authority to exist and enjoy succession for the full term and period of ninety-nine years from date hereof, unless sooner dissolved. The Domicile of this corporation shall be in the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana. All citations and other legal processes shall be served upon the President, or in case of his absence or inability to act, upon the Vice President. The President shall be the executive officer of the corporation and shall preside at the meetings of the Board of Directors and stockholders.

The object and purpose for which this corporation is established and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be: To construct, maintain and operate a Steam Laundry and to do a general laundry business, to do any and all things that are necessary and incidental to the conducting of a Steam Laundry as well as the right to operate the same in and throughout the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana.

This corporation may sue or be sued in its corporate name, make and use a corporate seal, the same to break and alter at pleasure; hold, have, receive, purchase, convey, sell, mortgage, hypothecate, pledge, lease, sub-lease, and convey real and personal and mixed property; also borrow and lend money, and make contracts, make and establish such by-laws, rules and regulations as may be necessary, and the same to alter and change at pleasure; and shall possess all the rights and privileges to which corporations are or may be authorized and entitled to possess. This corporation may exercise its corporate powers within any other State or territory of this Union.

The capital stock of said corporation shall be Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars, divided into and represented by seven hundred and fifty shares of the sum of twenty (\$20) dollars each, which said stock shall be paid for in cash, at the time of subscription, or the same may be issued at not less than par, in payment of cash, or in property or rights actually received or purchased by said corporation, or the same may be issued, full paid, for money advanced and for such other valuable consideration or service, as the Board of Directors of this corporation may determine, provided that no stock shall be issued until consideration therefor has been received by said corporation: Said shares of stock shall be signed by the President and Secretary-Treasurer. At all elections by, or meetings of, the stockholders, each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote to be cast by the person in whose name the stock appears on the books of the corporation, or by his agent or proxy, duly authorized to that effect in writing. This corporation shall not be a going concern as soon as the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars is subscribed and paid in.

No stockholder shall have authority or right to sell or otherwise dispose of his stock in whole or in part without first giving the Board of Directors fifteen days notice in writing of his intention or desire to dispose of any of his stock or a part thereof, and allowing the Board of Directors, or in its default, any stockholder, the first opportunity of purchasing the stock. After which fifteen days, the said stock may be sold in open market. The stock of said corporation may be transferred under the above conditions, provided such transfer be made on the books of said corporation at its office at Covington, in the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and on surrender of the certificate therefor. The Board of Directors shall have the right to determine how much stock shall be issued.

The business affairs and corporate powers of this corporation shall be transacted by a Board of Directors to be composed of nine (9) stockholders. No person shall be eligible as a Director or Officer as herein provided in this charter who is not a stockholder in this corporation. The members of the Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority of the votes of the stockholders cast at a meeting to be held for that purpose each year. The following named persons shall constitute the first Board of Directors: Henry B. Ayers, Dr. S. M. Hebert, James Mullally, J. P. Davis, W. R. Badon, E. J. Frederick, Paul Herbez, Emile Beaucaudray, Dr. C. Z. Williams. Said Board shall continue in office until October 1908, on the first Monday thereof, and their successors are elected, on which date, and thereafter annually, an election for directors shall be held at the office of the corporation, at Covington, in the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, after fifteen days notice thereof shall have been given by publication in one of the newspapers published in the Parish of St. Tammany, by two publications thereof during said time. A failure to elect Directors on the date above mentioned, shall not dissolve this corporation, but the existing Board of Directors shall continue to hold office, and another election shall be held as soon thereafter as practicable of which notice shall be given in the manner already provided for notice of meetings.

Every Board of Directors shall elect a President, Vice President, and a Treasurer who will also be Secretary, from among their own number. The officers as herein created shall

be filed for the ensuing year as follows: Henry B. Ayers, President; Dr. S. M. Hebert, Vice-President; James Mullally, Secretary-Treasurer.

Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors, from any cause, shall be filled by the remaining members of the Board of Directors from among the stockholders of the corporation, five members of the Board shall constitute a quorum thereof, unless otherwise provided by the Board of Directors.

The Board of Directors shall make such by-laws, rules and regulations as they think necessary, and change and alter same at pleasure. Name and appoint other officers and employees, and fix their salaries, term of service with the right to dismiss them at said Board's pleasure. And said Board shall have the right to determine and fix the salaries and duties of the several officers herein provided for, and scribe other duties to said officers as will best subservise the interest and welfare of the corporation. They shall also have the power to sell, convey, mortgage, pledge, lease, sub-lease, and purchase property, movable, immovable, personal and mixed; borrow and lend money, and issue notes and bonds, make contracts and do all things which may be necessary to properly transact and manage the business of this corporation.

This act of incorporation may be changed, modified or amended, or said corporation may be dissolved with the assent of a majority of the stock present or represented at a general meeting of the stockholders of said corporation, and convened for such purposes after thirty days previous notice of such meeting shall have been given by advertisement in one of the newspapers published in the Parish of St. Tammany by four publications during said time. Whenever this corporation is dissolved, either by limitation or from any other cause, its affairs shall be liquidated under the superintendence of three commissioners chosen for that purpose from among the stockholders, by a majority in amount of the stockholders as above set forth in this article. In the event of the death or inability of any of said commissioners the survivors shall continue to act.

No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or debts thereof in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares subscribed for or owned by him, nor shall any informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null, or exposing a stockholder to any liability beyond the unpaid balance, if any, of his stock.

This done and passed in my notarial office, in the town of Covington, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, on the day, month and year herein first above written in the presence of competent witnesses of lawful age, and residents of said town, who have signed their names together with said parties and me, notary, after reading of the whole.
