The Saturday train gets in at 7 o'clock, now, and the evening train for New Orleans leaves every afternoon at 4:15 instead of 5:15.

The Allen residence near Abita was slightly damaged by fire last Tuesday, caused by sparks igniting dry leaves on the roof. Insured.

The Covington lodge of Woodmen of the World will give an excursion to New Orleans Sunday, November 3.

J. S. Jones, has sold several squares of ground in his addition to Ramsey, lately, and there is to be a new butcher shop and fruit stand.

Mr. John Hubert, fireman at the Rausch saw mill, near Abita, had his hand injured by the saw, last Saturday. He was attended by Dr. F. J. Heintz.

Little Annie May Ryan, age 4 years, of New Orleans, died at Abita Springs Saturday, Oct. 26, and was interred in New Orleans Oct. 27.

The Covington Steam Laundry Company has purchased the old shoe factory, which will be remodeled. The board of directors will meet next Monday.

John Salzer, of New Orleans, is erecting a barn near the Wagner place, a couple of miles from Abita Springs, and we understand will soon build a handsome residence.

August Golmick has received his piping and is getting ready to put down a flowing well at his place in Abita Springs. He expects to get water at between 600 and 700 feet.

The second monthly meeting of the Parish Teachers' Association will be held in the High School Building, Covington, November 9, and will be attended by about fifty-five teachers.

The Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern are laying steel rails on their road this side of Hammond, extending toward Covington, and the road is expected to be completed in four or five months.

The farmer acknowledges receipt of an invitation to attend the opening dance of the Covington Athletic Club at their Club House on Wednesday evening, October 30, at 8:30 o'clock.

The portable saw mill belonging to Covington Naval Stores Company was destroyed by fire at Onvill last Tuesday, Oct. 29. No lumber was burned. Loss \$1500; no insurance.

The basket ball contest at the Athletic Club House last Monday night, between the Athletic Club and the Covington High School team resulted in a victory for the Athletics by a score of 38 to 4. They also defeated a "pick-up" team 16 to 9.

The Covington Dramatic Club will give a vaudeville entertainment for the benefit of the fire protection fund under the auspices of the L. A. C. L., on Thursday and Friday nights, November 14 and 15. The full program will be published in next week's paper.

The thoughtful kindness of Mr. A. F. Helwich, the florist, in presenting the beautiful bouquet of arbor vita and white chrysanthemums for the grave of the late Mr. W. G. Kentzel, is greatly appreciated by Mrs. Kentzel and family.

The flowing well that is being put down at the 10-mile still, at Onvill Station, has reached a depth of over 1600 feet and a good flow obtained, but the breaking of the pipe has necessitated sending for more pipe. As soon as this arrives the work will be completed.

Kenner Smith, 15 months old, youngest child of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Smith, of Covington, was severely burned about the feet last Saturday. The little fellow was playing with his wagon and jumped from it into an ash pile where a trash heap had been burned. He was attended by Dr. Williams.

Sunday, Oct. 27, Holy Camp No. 90, Woodmen of the World, unveiled the monument of Sovereign Joe L. Lacroix, at the Columbus Street Cemetery. A large number of people were present to witness the ceremony, the orator of the day being General Booth, of New Orleans.

The road machine has been withdrawn from the Mandeville road to the Abita Springs road, after working about one and one-half miles. Work will be continued on the Mandeville road as soon as the stumps are removed. Meantime the Abita road is being worked, commencing at Judge King's place. It is estimated that good roads can be made at less than \$60 per mile, after the stumps have been removed, and for considerably less on roads that have had fairly good working previously.

Following the ceremony a lawn festival will be given under the direction of the ladies of the congregation, the proceeds to be used in purchasing new pews for the church. An excursion train will be run from New Orleans.
