Work on the foundation of the new building of the Covington Bank and Trust Company is now under way and rapid progress is being made.

The sudden and severe change in the weather has been extremely fatal to infants, and there is a general expression of sympathy in the community for the afflicted families.

Dixon Third Year Basketball Team and the Covington High School Team played a game last Wednesday at the Dixon gymnasium, which resulted in a score of 19 to 4, in favor of Dixon.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the ice company at Slidell, the resignation of Secretary J. B. Kent was accepted. The company will probably build in January.

The Depre building in Mandeville, the foundation of which is now being laid, will be constructed of brick and concrete, and will greatly add to the appearance of the town.

Mr. Butler, of Terrebonne parish, introduced a resolution requesting sheriff, tax collectors, clerks of court and assessors to forward to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, without delay, a full statement of the entire revenues of the several offices, attested by affidavit.

District Court was convened in Franklinton last Monday. Judge Thomas M. Burns on the Bench and Jos. B. Lancaster prosecuting. Ansi N. Simmons will be tried at this term of Court for the Varnado murder. He will be defended by J. Vol Brock, of Franklinton, and S. D. Kemp, of Amite City.

At the Robust meeting just held at Slidell, twelve new members were added to the church, the baptismal services by immersion, being conducted by Rev. D. C. Edwards, in the presence of several hundred people.

The W. H. Kentzel Printing House delivered the new Cumberland Telephone Directory last week, and as usual turned out a very neat job. The new directory shows a considerable increase in number of phones.

Rev. E. Rennie, of the Covington Episcopal church, conducted services in the Union Protestant church of Mandeville, last Sunday evening, preaching an eloquent sermon to a large congregation. It is expected that an Episcopal congregation will be formed and that services will be held every other Sunday in Mandeville.

Miss Laura Hedges has devoted much time to travel during the past year, in company with relatives, having among other cities visited the great metropolis of New York; but she says it was with a sigh of relief that she placed her feet upon the soil of dear old Covington a week or so ago, and breathed the medicated air from the surrounding pines. She is now residing with her father in Boston street near Massachusetts Street.

It is true this slight cost was made possible by the donation of the brick by Mr. Schneider; but the work is not made less noteworthy by his philanthropy, and praise is due him for the interest he has taken in these matters and for his personal attention to the work performed.
