TOWN COUNCIL. Mandeville, La., Jan. 13, 1908. Council met in regular monthly session this evening at 8:30 o'clock. Hon. H. Borey, Mayor, presiding. Present, Aldermen: A. C. Bosse, S. F. Phillips, E. Dubourg and James Band. Absent: Jos. M. Smith.

Minutes of the last meeting, Dec. 2, were adopted. Treasurer's report was received, on motion of Mr. A. C. Bosse, seconded by Mr. Smith, and ordered spread on the minutes as follows: Cash on hand Nov. 30, 1907 \$407 36

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the council of the town of Mandeville, La., in legal session convened, that a license tax be and is hereby levied for the year 1908 upon each person, corporation, firm or association, pursuing any occupation, trade, business or calling in the town of Mandeville which is subject to be licensed.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, that the amount of license for this town for each trade, occupation, business or calling carried on or conducted in this town, subject to a license is hereby fixed at the same as is now levied and collected by the State for such trade, occupation, business or calling within the corporate limits of this town, except the liquor license which shall be one hundred dollars for the year 1908.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, that the license tax due this town shall be and is hereby due and collectable at the same time and in the same manner as license due the State, and in the event the same are not paid when due, it is ordered that the Tax Collector report the same to the town attorney, who is hereby authorized and instructed to fourthwith institute legal proceedings to enforce payment of same.
