**DIED.**—In Covington, La.,  
Thursday, February 13, 1908,  
F. Ruiz Alpuente, aged 17 years,  
6 months, son of Jas. A. Al-  
puente and Naomi Blanc.

The funeral took place Friday  
afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from  
the residence of the deceased,  
in Twenty First Avenue, and  
from St. Peter's Church, Rev.  
Jos. Koegerl officiating.

The deceased was buried with  
military honors.

The offerings of flowers were  
unusually beautiful and massive,  
notably the cross of Fourth  
Troop and the flowers from the  
Covington Athletic Club.

The sudden death of Mr. Al-  
puente was a great shock to his  
friends. He had just entered  
into a game of basket ball, be-  
ing a member of the Covington  
High School team, which was  
playing against the Dixon, when  
he complained of a pain in his  
side. He sat down, thinking it  
would pass off, but got no bet-  
ter, and in spite of his protesta-  
tion that he would be all right  
in a moment, his friends be-  
came alarmed and sent for Dr.  
Tolson. Within ten minutes af-  
ter the doctor's arrival he was  
dead. On other occasions he  
had complained of a lump in his  
side which appeared upon ex-  
treme physical exertion, and it  
is supposed the cause of his  
death was heart failure.

He was a member of Fourth  
Troop Cavalry, of which his fa-  
ther is captain, and was a great  
favorite with all. He will be  
sadly missed by his many  
friends.

**Shooting Affray.**

About 7 p. m., Tuesday, the  
quiet of the streets was distur-  
bed by the loud report of a re-  
volver in the neighborhood of  
the jail, and many who had pre-  
pared themselves for a quiet  
rest after the evening meal  
rushed to the scene of distur-  
bance.

Town Marshal Dulion and  
Officer Max Loyd were for-  
tunately within a short dis-  
tance, and their prompt response  
resulted in the capture of the  
man who did the shooting and  
three other negroes.

Within a short distance of  
the jail in a negro eating house  
kept by Nealey Griffin, Mose  
Murray, a negro, had just seat-  
ed himself at a table and was  
in the act of drinking a cup of  
coffee when Henry Griffin drew  
his revolver and fired, the ball  
striking him in the chest, rang-  
ing upward and lodging in his  
shoulder. A second later Mar-  
shal Dulion and Officer Loyd put  
in an appearance and began to  
gather them in. One negro  
caught by Officer Loyd resisted,  
and while attempting to free  
himself exposed a revolver in  
his hip pocket, when another  
negro seized and made away  
with it.

As is usually the case, the  
man who was shot was an in-  
offensive negro. He was in the  
employ of W. A. Hood, in his  
turturine orchard.

Dr. Williams was called and  
attended the wounded negro.

Griffin, after shooting Mur-  
ray, threw his pistol in the  
alleyway where it was found,  
and is supposed to be one  
of the 32 specials that was  
stolen from H. H. Smith & Sons  
hardware store last week.

Griffin is from somewhere near  
Mount Herman and is a brother  
of Nealey Griffin, who keeps  
the eating house, although  
Nealey denied knowing any-  
thing about him.

Further inquiry brought  
to light that the shooting prob-  
ably was the result of a disagre-  
ement in the matter of home-  
steading a piece of land.

Murray was taken to New  
Orleans for surgical treatment.  
It is thought he cannot recover.
