Railroad Wreck
At 9:11 a. m., last Monday, the passengers at the Abita Springs station who were awaiting the morning train to Covington and were watching it as it approached about a mile down the track, were horrified to see the coaches careen to one side and pitched into the ditch beside the track. Everyone rushed to the scene of accident. One of the first to reach the wreck was Dr. Louis Heintz, of Abita, but fortunately his services were not needed. Miraculous as it seems, no one was hurt. The engineer reversed the lever immediately upon discovering the danger and came to a stop by the time the coaches tipped over. Mr. Marshal Reid, the baggage-master, had been relieved by Mr. C. D. Johnson. He was in the baggage car at the time of the accident, however, and was thrown into one corner, where he was protected by a barrel of beer, which had fallen in front of him. He had his hand slightly bruised. Mr. Johnson was slightly injured on the leg by a trunk falling against him. No one else was injured that we are aware of.

If the accident had occurred a hundred yards further on, where the embankment is steep, the results might have been much more serious.

The railroad company provided teams and carried the belated passengers on to Covington.

The accident is supposed to have been caused by rotten railroad ties.

Hon. John Brewster.
Hon. John Brewster, State Tax Collector of the Second Ward, in New Orleans, and one of the most prominent Democratic leaders in the City of New Orleans, died at his home in that city at 10:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, of heart complications. Captain Brewster was born in County Mayo, Ireland, in 1835. He was the father of Sheriff T. E. Brewster, of this parish.

Ordinance.
Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Covington, in legal session convened, That all owners of improved property situated within the corporate limits of the Town of Covington, La., be and they are hereby required to number their respective houses, within ten days after they are notified to do so by the duly constituted authorities of said town. That should any such owner so served with notice, as aforesaid, fail within ten days after the service of such notice upon him to number his house as required by this ordinance, he shall be subject to a fine not to exceed five dollars, or imprisonment in the town jail for a period of not more than ten days, or both, at the discretion of the Mayor.
