WRESTLING MATCH.

Lacroix Wins the Championship of St. Tammany Parish.

The much-talked-of wrestling match between Ed. Stern, of the Covington Athletic Club, and Ed. Lacroix, of Abita Springs, took place at Cantrelle's hall last Friday evening.

The preliminary wrestling between T. P. Doty and P. V. Robinson, both of Covington Athletic Club, was won by Doty in two straight falls, catch as catch can, the first in 6 minutes and a half, and the second in 7 minutes and 45 seconds.

The Stern-Lacroix match created a lively interest for the double reason that it was supposed to be a match between science and strength and a contest for honors between Covington and Abita Springs, and quite a sum of money changed hands. The fact that no one could be found in Covington to throw Stern led to the belief that he was invincible in the amateur class, and Lacroix was picked out as a fitting antagonist, having many admirers who were confident that his strength would make a winner of him. Lacroix is a fine horseman, spends much of his time in the open air and is inured to hardship, all of which was counted in his favor, while Stern was confined by his duties to the store most of the time.

Dr. Saurez had refereed the bout between Doty and Robinson and expected to referee the Stern-Lacroix match, but Lacroix's backers objected, and it looked for a moment as if there was going to be a hitch in the proceedings. Repeated calls for Brewster were made, but he did not respond. Then, catching sight of J. E. Cotton, the crowd yelled for him until he appeared on the stage. All being satisfactory, Mr. Cotton announced that he would give both men a square deal, and requested that the audience refrain from making any remarks.

When the men faced each other for the first bout Lacroix looked much the larger of the two, although there was but five pounds difference in weight, Lacroix weighing 176 and Stern 171 pounds. Both men are magnificent specimens of physical manhood.

After a few preliminary passes, as if to try his opponent's mettle, Stern took to the mat, evidently preferring to take his chances there and make Lacroix do the work. Very little scientific work was done in this bout. Lacroix seemed to work more for the scissors hold than any other, and used it at every opportunity, finally gaining a fall, apparently without much trouble. The work was fast and showed that Lacroix was much the stronger. Time 3 minutes and 30 seconds.

The second bout was very much a repetition of the first, Stern again taking the mat and Lacroix doing most of the work. Several times Lacroix got the toe hold but apparently did not understand how to make the most of it. He was repeatedly balked in his effort to get a half-Nelson, and finally fouled with a strangle hold and the fall was given to Stern.

Time 12 minutes and 14 seconds.

The third bout was a good one, not as a scientific contest, but as an exhibition of strength and endurance. Stern again took the mat. Lacroix repeatedly tried for a half-Nelson and failed, and finally through sheer desperation picked Stern up bodily and dashed him headforemost to the mat. This maneuver was repeated later on without effect. But all this terrible exertion was telling on Lacroix, and his efforts to repeat the trick failed. He got the toe hold, but did not use it to advantage. After repeated efforts to turn Stern, he seemed disconcerted and uncertain what to do next, and finally concluded to take the mat himself. His violent exertions were evidently telling upon him, for he had been doing all the work. Stern lost no time in hopping on Lacroix's back, and with a crotch and half-Nelson had Lacroix on his back in a jiffy, but he was too anxious and in his hurry failed to block, and Lacroix took advantage of it, pinning him to the mat.

Time 37 minutes and 14 seconds. Lacroix has much to learn, but if he will get wise to the game, it will be a long time before the amateur championship will change hands in St. Tammany parish. His strength is remarkable, he is quick and has good staying qualities.

His trainers were Paul Castelot and Frank Martin.

It is rumored that several wrestlers want to get into the game, and also that Dr. Saurez would challenge the winner, but we can make no announcement this week.
