

# PICKED A DEAD ONE

### Cats in Government Employ.

"Among the many expenditures of the United States government each year there is one that is far more peculiar than that of any other country in the world," said an employee of the postoffice department the other day.

"But few people are aware of the fact that Uncle Sam annually appropriates, through the postoffice department, a small sum of money for the support of an army of cats in a number of his postoffices throughout the country. The money is used to buy food for the felines, though this seems somewhat of a reflection upon their ability to catch rats and mice, for which purpose they are kept in the postoffices.

At times much trouble is caused by the rodents gnawing the mail pouches and opening mail addressed to another person, regardless of the penalties usually imposed upon human beings for such an act. It has been found that the cats cannot live entirely on rat dainties, and milk and meat must be supplied them at intervals. The average cost of the cat food at a postoffice where they are kept is about \$18 per year. Uncle Sam has detachments of his cat army stationed at the postoffices at Little Rock, Ark.; Los Angeles, Cal.; New Haven, Conn.; Minneapolis, Minn.; Binghamton, N. Y.; New York, N. Y.; Portland, Ore., and Norfolk, Va.

### Virginia Seeks Large Sum.

The state of Virginia wants the United States to pay a debt of \$160,000 which was contracted at the instance of George Washington. The first president, who was greatly interested in building up the national capital, had strong influence in his native state and persuaded Virginia to make the government a loan of \$120,000 for the construction of public buildings. This money has never been paid back.

Representative Carlin, who represents the district in which Washington lived, has introduced a bill for the repayment of the original debt with interest, making the total amount of the claim \$1,620,000. Mr. Carlin's bill provides the money shall be paid to the Mount Vernon association to which the state of Virginia has released all claims for the debt. The money is to be used for the building of a magnificent boulevard along the south bank of the Potomac. It is proposed that the boulevard shall be 200 feet wide and that different sections of it shall be decorated and beautified by the 46 states. Several years ago a similar bill passed the senate but was not acted on in the house. An appropriation of \$50,000 for a survey of the boulevard has been made by congress. The justice of the claim of Virginia is not denied by the government, but it has never been pushed by the state.

### Electrical Home Show.

A "home show" to be held at the Grand Central Palace in New York, will be devoted to all the things in the constructive, decorative and furnishing lines relating to the home. A special effort is being made to have the electrical feature as complete as possible, and it is hoped that devices all the very latest electrical devices designed for home use. An international electrical show on a large scale will be held at Marseilles, France, this summer.

## FINALLY PAID FOR SIDING.

### Ludicrous Features in Claim Against Government.

Of course, only a part, very likely a small part, of the claims entered against the government have justice as a basis. In order to find out the truth of things the government occasionally is obliged to spend many times the amount of money involved.

One of the most curious claim cases ever known to congress was that of Senora Feliciano Mendola, who lived at Angeles, Pampanga, Philippine Islands. The senora rented a house to Uncle Sam for the use of some of his teamsters. When the mule-driving contingent moved out of the house after a short occupancy the senora declared under oath that some of the siding boards were missing from the kitchen wall, and she asked for \$200 in gold to repay her for the damage to her property.

This case of Senora Feliciano Mendola fills 14 pages of a house of representatives document. It contains a long letter from the secretary of war on the question of the value of kitchen sidings, another letter from the quartermaster-general of the United States and 53 communications from army officers and civilians of various ranks and conditions.

A board of officers was convened to pass on the validity of the senora's claim. The board was in session for days, many of its members coming from a long distance to attend. One teamster, William Langworth, by name, swore that the senora's kitchen sidings were chewed up and eaten by red ants. Teamster Summerville swore that in his opinion the boards dropped out of place by their own weight. Teamster Pickle said: "Them boards was punk."

The army board which sat on the case thought it was very doubtful in strict justice if Senora Feliciano should be allowed any money, but finally the members granted her the sum of \$30 in gold. This action, of course, was not final, but the committee on war claims in house and senate approved the finding.

The senora received \$30, and doubtless it gave her some satisfaction to know that Uncle Sam had spent about \$1,000 to get authority to pay for a kitchen siding which the senora's destruction either by way of a teamster's foot or a red ant's stomach.

### IN THE NATIONAL CEMETERIES.

Representative Chaney Recently Gave Figures as to Unknown Dead.

The army of the unknown dead buried in the cemeteries of the United States government is an enormous one. In a speech on the pension appropriation bill Representative Chaney of Indiana submitted figures prepared by the quartermaster general showing that there are 152,103 unknown soldiers and sailors whose remains are interred in the national cemeteries.

The total number of buried dead in these cemeteries is 353,385. The known number 201,232. The government maintains no less than 83 national cemeteries. It is not generally known that one of these is outside of the United States, being located at Mexico City. Over 1,500 soldiers of the Mexican war rest there, half of them unknown.

The largest of the national cemeteries is the one at Arlington, just across the river from Washington. It has over 20,000 interments, of which 4,625 are those of unknown dead. Next in size is the cemetery at Vicksburg, where there are 16,883 interments.

Third in size is Nashville with 16,883 interments, while the fourth largest is at Fredericksburg, Va.

Not all the interments are those of union soldiers. About 9,300 are confederates. One of the great cemeteries is at Andersonville, Ga., where large numbers of northern prisoners died and were buried. The interments there number nearly 14,000.

Chekib Bey is a widower. Mme. Mehmed Ali Bey is therefore only the second high-class Turkish woman to come to this country as a diplomatic hostess. The first, Mme. Ali Ferrough Bey, was a bride, and it was in deference to this fact that the sultan permitted her to establish a precedent for her countrywomen. However, that under no circumstances was she to go into society with her face uncovered, and thus neglect one of the cardinal virtues of her native land. This promise prevented her from dining at the White House and participating in other affairs of the diplomat corps where gentlemen were to be present. It did not, however, prevent her accepting invitations to ladies' meetings or luncheons, which she did whenever the opportunity offered. On one occasion, at least, she returned to the legation as rapidly as she left it, for her would be hostesses had carefully excluded all male relatives and friends from the house and then for the luncheon admitted waiters of the masculine gender.

## THE PAINTING SEASON.

## THE LIVING ROOM.

### It Should at All Times Be a "Livable" Room.

What to do with the living room is a problem that confronts every housekeeper. The living room should be in fact as well as in name a living room—a livable room. It is the room in which the most of our time at home is spent, the hours we have for leisure, the time we have for play, the place where we entertain our friends and it is absolutely essential that the walls and furnishings of the living room should be harmonious in color, suitable in texture, and durable in material.

The rich, soft, solid colored walls are the ideal walls for the living rooms. They make a better background for pictures, throw the furniture out in better relief, are less discordant with rugs and carpeting, and indicate a higher degree of taste and culture than do the colored monstrosities which we paste on when we apply wall paper.

The alabastined wall is the only correct form of a tinted or solid colored wall. Fortunately it is the only clean way, and more fortunately it is the only permanent way; the only way that does not involve the endless labor in the future.

In lighting the walls some thought must be given the color. Light colors reflect 85% of the light thrown upon them. Dark colors reflect but 15%. Lighting bills can be saved by choosing a color which will reflect the largest degree of light. In north rooms use warm colors or colors which reflect light. In south and west rooms sometimes the light can be modified by the use of darker colors. Dark greens absorb the light; light yellows reflect it; browns modify it, and so on, through the scale of colors. The color scheme of a room not only is dependent upon the color of the carpets but it is also dependent upon the light of the room.
