### Digest of Duties of Local School Trustees.

To be elected by patrons of school by ballot.

To handle \$1.00 incidental fee for comfort of children, by supplying needed supplies, repair, etc.

To have general oversight of school and to report to the Superintendent such violations of the rules on the part of teacher or pupils as are serious enough to demand his attention.

To secure for the school the funds due it or if necessary to raise special taxes.

To sign teachers' report.

To secure the attendance in school of every child in the school district.

To recommend teachers, but not to contract with them.

### State Board Resolutions

Resolutions adopted by the State Board of Education at a regular meeting held in Baton Rouge, on July 20, 1908, concerning applicants for parish superintendencies, under Act No. 49 of 1908.

Resolved, That any person who is now holding the position of parish superintendent, by virtue of this fact shall be entitled to a certificate of eligibility, and that said certificate shall issue without further examination, upon proper application.

Resolved, That any applicant for a certificate of eligibility to the office of parish superintendent shall report at the office of State Superintendent of Education at Baton Rouge, at 9 o'clock a. m., on August 29, 1908, and take the examination hereinafter provided.

Resolved, That if any applicant for certificate of eligibility to do so, he may appear for examination before the parish superintendent and the examining committee of the parish, at the parish seat of any parish, on August 29, 1908, at 9 a. m., and the parish superintendent shall be the sealed questions furnished by the State Board of Education in the presence of at least one other member of the examining committee and all the applicants. The examination shall be then held, and immediately thereafter the questions and answers sealed shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the State Board of Education at Baton Rouge.

Resolved, That the applicants shall be examined on the following subjects: School Supervision, School administration, and the Theory and Art of Teaching.

Resolved, That all persons applying for a certificate of eligibility must comply with the provisions and qualifications as set forth in Act 49 of 1908.

Resolved, That a committee of five members, to be appointed by the President of the State Board of Education, whose duty it shall be to prepare all questions as above provided, to examine all applicants, and answer all papers returned from the parishes, and report to this Board at a meeting to be held on September 11, 1908.

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Board, parish superintendents, to be efficient under Act No. 49, of 1908, should devote their entire time to the schools of their respective parishes.

### ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., That a special election be and is hereby ordered to be held in accordance with law, in the fifth ward, of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., to take the sense of the qualified voters of said ward, in regard to the granting or withholding the issuance of license for the sale of intoxicating liquor within the limits of said ward.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Board of Supervisors of Election for the Parish of St. Tammany, La., hereby be and is instructed and empowered to give notice of such special election by proclamation; to appoint commissioners and clerk of election, in accordance with law.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That the ballots used for said election shall be as follows: For the sale of intoxicating liquor in the limits of said ward.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall take effect after its promulgation.

### V. M. LEFEBVRE.

In this issue of the paper we present the announcement of Mr. F. M. Lefebvre of West Baton Rouge for Congress subject to the voters of the approaching Democratic primary.



Mr. Lefebvre is a native of Louisiana, born in Iberville Parish, from where he moved in his early manhood to his present home of West Baton Rouge and where he has continuously lived and followed the occupation of a farmer.

Although he is not like all other congressmen and congressional aspirants, an "Attorney at Law," yet he has proved his ability to serve his parish and State in public position with due credit to himself and his constituents in various capacities.

In 1892 he was called upon by a unanimous vote to serve his district in the State Senate where he early gained influence and prominence.

He served his parish in the constitutional convention of 1898, and no man labored more earnestly than he to secure to the white people of the State the absolute right of State, parish and ward government.

In 1896 he was nominated and elected to the position of sheriff of his parish, which position he filled to the entire satisfaction of his constituents until 1899 when he was prevailed upon to accept the position of member of the Board of Commissioners of the Atchafalaya Basin Levee District where he has continuously served since and of which Board he has been the honored president for the past five years.

Mr. Lefebvre is an ardent advocate of the improvement, by the National Government, of inland waterways of the State and district, that navigable streams may be offered as a check upon the exorbitant railroad rates and corporation. In fact the ambition of his life seems to be devoted to the fostering and advancement of the State's best interest and especially to her agricultural and manufacturing industries, and should he be selected to serve his district in the national congress there is no doubt of his ability and untiring energy in any and all questions pertaining to the interest of his native State as well as his unceasing watchfulness and scrutiny of any bills that might be detrimental to or of doubtful interest to her welfare.

### TAX ORDINANCE.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, That there be and is hereby levied for the year A. D. 1908 a tax of 8 mills upon the dollar upon all taxable property in the parish for general and parochial purposes, divided as follows:

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That 4 mills are hereby appropriated therefrom for criminal expenses, 2 mills for the benefit of public schools, 2 mills for the general expenses of the parish, and 2 mills for the benefit of public roads, and that the sheriff and tax collector do collect the amount appropriated therefrom for criminal expenses, and for the benefit of public roads upon all property in the parish subject to taxation, including that situated in the towns of Mandeville and Covington.

Be it further enacted, etc., That the sheriff and tax collector shall receive in payment of parish taxes (the amount appropriated for public schools excepted) the fully approved certificates of the grand and petit jurors for per diem and mileage, and certificates of members of the Police Jury for per diem and mileage, and that he proceed with the collection of taxes now levied, according to law.
