Council Proceedings

Covington, La., Aug. 6, 1908.

The council met on above date pursuant to call of the Mayor. Present—E. V. Richard, Mayor, W. A. Hood, Jacob Seiler, Paul J. Lacroix, J. L. Smith and C. M. Poole, Jr. Absent—E. J. Frederick.

It was moved and seconded that the action of the Council, naming the St. Tammany Banking Co. and Savings Bank as custodian of the funds of the town of Covington, be and is hereby repealed. Carried.

It was moved and seconded, that whereas, the bids of both, the St. Tammany Banking Co. and Savings Bank and the Covington Bank and Trust Co., being the same, the funds of the town of Covington be and the same are hereby ordered divided equally between said banks, and they are hereby named fiscal agent or agents, for the deposit of all public money of the town of Covington, La., until April 1910, in accordance with Act No. 23 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, passed at its extra session in the year 1907. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that from and after date the pound keeper shall post, at the Mayor's Court, a description of all animals in pound, for the period set forth in the different ordinances governing said animals. Carried.

The Mayor named the following as members of the Board of Health: Dr. H. E. Gautreaux, Dr. J. F. Pigott, Dr. E. B. Warren, C. F. Hardie and H. J. Smith.

It was moved and seconded that the Council adjourn subject to call. Carried.

Capt. Weaver's New Boat "Josie."

The "Josie," Capt. Weaver's new boat, made its maiden trip to New Orleans last Wednesday, with a full cargo and a number of passengers. This little boat is not only fitted up for the best and securest handling of freight, but is specially fitted for the carrying of stock with security and without risk. Arrangements are also made for the seating and comfort of fifty passengers.

The boat was built by Oulliber Bros., of Madisonville, is all cypress, 100x24 feet, 81 tons gross, 50 tons net. She has a 16x16 high pressure engine, 40 horse power, and a Scotch marine water back boiler, made by J. H. Murphy, of New Orleans. She will make quick time and be a great addition to the river craft.

WICKLIFFE SPEAKS.

A high compliment was paid to Hon. Robt. C. Wickliffe, at the speaking last Monday night at Cantrelle's hall, by the ladies of St. Tammany parish, who honored him by their presence in large numbers, and attested their appreciation of his logical arguments and very pretty compliments to the women of the Florida Parishes, by frequent applause.

There were on the platform with the honorable speaker: Mayor E. V. Richard, Councilmen E. J. Frederick, C. M. Poole, Jr. and Jacob Seiler, City Attorney E. H. Richard, Hon. Crawford Williams, E. J. Domergue, Jr., Frank Keller, C. F. Hardie, M. C. Smith, W. L. Fussell and D. H. Mason, Jr., and E. D. Kentzel, of the Farmer.

After a few appropriate remarks Mr. M. C. Smith, master of ceremonies, introduced as the first speaker, Hon. E. H. Richard, who went over the twelve parishes in the Sixth District, showing that the nomination of Mr. Wickliffe was an assured fact, from all reasonable deduction. He paid very high compliments to Mr. Wickliffe as a man of character and ability and spoke of him as second to none as an orator.

Mr. Wickliffe said, that while not lacking in appreciation of the compliments paid him by Mr. Richard as an orator, he much preferred to be looked upon as a worker, an accomplisher, a doer of deeds rather than an oratorical painter of fanciful pictures. That if he went to Congress he wished to earn the reputation of being of some practical assistance to his constituency. The man who accomplished things was the man who worked, not the man who merely talked and made flowery speeches.

While complimenting Congressman Favrot on his picturesque utterances in the national house of representatives he convulsed his audience by a ludicrous illustration of the uselessness of such oratory to the people of the Sixth District, when devoted to the Philippines Islands, in the Florida parishes, and said that with its rapid growth it would soon be entitled to a government building.

That the traffic of our rivers demanded that they be dredged and cleared and made available for the coming trade that was sure to follow in the wake of increased prosperity and renewed public enterprise. It was work that would accomplish these things, not eulogies of the mocking bird, nor the recitation of flowery lines.

In speaking of the probable outcome of the primary election, Mr. Wickliffe said that the value placed upon a man by his own community should be a pretty fair test of his qualifications. He said that there was a license for the year 1908, unless immediately paid.

ORDINANCE

An ordinance authorizing the Tax Collector to turn over all unpaid licenses to the Town Attorney for collection, and empowering the said Attorney to collect in addition to the said licenses the sum of 10 per cent thereof as costs for collection.

Section 1. Be it further ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Covington, Louisiana, in regular session convened, that the Tax Collector is hereby authorized and empowered to turn over all unpaid licenses to the Town Attorney of Covington, for collection.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the Town Attorney is hereby authorized to collect 10 per cent additional on the amount of all licenses remaining unpaid, and to once institute proceedings against all persons owing a license for the year 1908, unless immediately paid.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance take effect from and after its passage.

ORDINANCE

An ordinance fixing the fee to be charged by the Improvement Committee in granting building permits.

Section 1. Be it further ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Covington, Louisiana, in regular session convened, that the Improvement Committee is hereby authorized and empowered to charge a fee of fifty cents on each permit granted for the construction of a building or buildings.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the said fee of fifty cents so charged shall be put in the hands of the Secretary and Tax Collector of the Town of Covington, and shall become a part of the general fund of said town.

ORDINANCE

An ordinance making it a misdemeanor for any one to bath in the public streams within the limits of the Town of Covington in a nude or partly nude condition, and fixing a penalty for any person or persons found guilty of a violation of this ordinance.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Covington, Louisiana, in regular session convened, that any person or persons bathing within the limits of the Town of Covington in a nude or partly nude condition shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that a nude or partly nude condition shall hereafter include any person or persons bathing without sufficient clothing to cover the body from the waist down as far as the knees.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that any person or persons found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be fined in a sum not to exceed \$25.00 or imprisonment not to exceed sixty days, or both at the discretion of the Mayor.

ORDINANCE

An ordinance making the tax of four mills, special school tax, levied on all taxable property in the Town of Covington for the year ending December 31, 1907, for school building purposes, according to an ordinance passed December 8, 1906, delinquent after the 15th day of August, 1908, and providing for the Secretary and Tax Collector to send notices to all delinquents and providing further for a charge of twenty-five cents in addition to the tax so levied on each notice sent.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the town of Covington, La., in regular session convened, that on and after Aug. 15, 1908, the tax of 4 mills levied on all taxable property of the town of Covington for the year ending December 31, 1907, are hereby declared to be due and delinquent.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the Secretary and Tax Collector

ORDINANCE

An ordinance making it a misdemeanor for any woman to enter a bar room within the limits of the Town of Covington, and providing a penalty for anyone found guilty of violating this ordinance.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Covington, Louisiana, in regular session convened, that any woman or women entering a bar-room, or room adjacent thereto, not used for general merchandise, hotel or office purposes, for any purpose whatever in the limits of the Town of Covington, except in the instance of an owner is hereby deemed to be a misdemeanor by so doing.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, etc., that any person found guilty of the violation of the provisions of this ordinance as above set forth shall be fined in a sum not to exceed \$50.00 or imprisonment for a period of time not to exceed sixty days, or both at the discretion of the Mayor.

An ordinance authorizing the Tax Collector to turn over all unpaid licenses to the Town Attorney for collection, and empowering the said Attorney to collect in addition to the said licenses the sum of 10 per cent thereof as costs for collection.

Section 1. Be it further ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Covington, Louisiana, in regular session convened, that the Tax Collector is hereby authorized and empowered to turn over all unpaid licenses to the Town Attorney of Covington, for collection.

ORDINANCE

An ordinance authorizing the Mayor to appoint and constitute a Board of Health in the town of Covington, La., and defining their duties.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the town of Covington, Louisiana, in regular session convened, that the Mayor of the town of Covington, La., is hereby authorized to appoint a Board of Health for the town of Covington, said board to be composed of three reputable physicians, and two citizens, residents of the town.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the duties of the said board are defined to be as follows: That the said members constituting this board shall have the power and authority to inspect the conditions existing in the town of Covington, Louisiana, and to report thereon to the Secretary of the Town of Covington and suggest means for the immediate remedy of such conditions; granting to them full powers herein and specially deputizing them as officers of the law to go and act.

Section 3. Be it further enacted, etc., that the physicians and citizens so serving on the board of health shall serve for the period of one year without compensation.

Section 4. Be it further enacted, etc., that the members comprising said board, shall elect its own officers and provide all necessary rules, etc., for the guidance of said members.

ORDINANCE

An ordinance defining dangerous and suspicious characters, making it a misdemeanor for any one to loiter in corners, or to act in any way that would lead to the impression that such person so doing is a dangerous and suspicious character, and providing a penalty for a violation of this ordinance.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the town of Covington, Louisiana, in regular session convened, from and after the passage of this ordinance, that any person loitering in corners, or in any other public place, or in any way that would lead to the impression that such person so doing is a dangerous and suspicious character, or any person having in his possession a firearm or firearms or other dangerous weapons, acting in a manner so as to disturb the peace, are hereby deemed to be dangerous and suspicious characters under this ordinance.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that any person charged with the said offense of being a dangerous and suspicious character, as above set forth, and found guilty of such charge, shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$50.00, or imprisonment not to exceed thirty days, or both at the discretion of the Mayor.

ORDINANCE

An ordinance prohibiting the keeping of dogs in excess within the limits of the town of Covington, and providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the town of Covington, La., in regular session convened, that from and after the passage of this ordinance, no person or persons shall be allowed to keep a dog or dogs in pens, or otherwise, within the limits of the town of Covington, unless such pens are constructed and kept in a sanitary condition, as will be approved by the Board of Health.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that any person or persons having a dog or dogs within the limits of the town of Covington, report the same to the Board of Health.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that any person or persons violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall suffer a fine not exceeding \$25.00, or imprisonment not exceeding thirty days; and that every dog such dogs are so kept will constitute a new offense under the meaning of this ordinance.

Section 1. Be it further ordained, etc., that it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ride on horseback, or to drive any horse or vehicle, automobile or any other conveyance, on the streets or public places in the town of Covington at such a rate of speed as will endanger the lives of any pedestrians walking on the streets or standing on said street corners, and
