The following clipping from the Picayune will be of interest to sportsmen in this parish.  
Now that the hunting season is about to begin, State Auditor Paul Arvielle is sending out to the Tax Collectors of the different parishes letters calling their attention to the fact that under the new law all hunters in Louisiana, no matter whether they go out for only one hunt a year, are required to get a hunting license, which is \$1 for all residents of Louisiana, and \$25 for non-residents. The feature of the new law is \$1 license for resident sportsmen. This law is going to mean a large revenue to Louisiana.  
If a person is found hunting with out this license he is subject to a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100. The license must be carried by the hunter on his person.  
General Manager N. G. Pearsall, of the New Orleans Great Northern said yesterday that statements which have been recently regarding the resumption of construction work on the Company's lines in Louisiana and Mississippi are erroneous.  
"We have not yet been able to resume construction," said Mr. Pearsall, "and I cannot tell when we will be able to do so. Mr. Sullivan has announced that the Great Southern Lumber Company's mill will begin operating Sep. 1, and by that time we hope to see nearly all of the twenty mills located on our lines in full blast. At the present time the majority, probably 90 per cent, are still shut down. The resumption of activity in this direction will mean a great deal to us."—Picayune.
