### Teachers for the Coming Term of Public School

The public is at this time asking many questions in regard to the public school of this town, as to when it will open and who the teachers will be, as to the grades of the children, where they will be taught, the hours of opening and closing and a multitude of other matters.  
From what we can learn, the schools will open at 9 o'clock sharp on Monday morning, October 5, and for the present, at least, the grades will be taught at the same places they were last year, i. e., the fourth and sixth grades being in the cottage on Columbia street, and the rest of the grades, including the high school, in the old building.

The faculty this year is a strong one, and no patron need fear that his or her child will not receive as good instruction here as at any other school in the State. The only great need of the school is, we are told, a lack of equipment for the high school, but we are sure this will come, as soon as the school is housed in the new building.

At the head of the faculty this year will be Prof. Elmer E. Lyon, long and favorably known to the people of Covington, among whom he has resided for a number of years. He is a graduate of Lawrence Academy of Groton, Mass., and of the New Hampshire State College, located at Durham, N. H. He has been teacher for nine years, the greater part of which has been in this section, in Dixon Academy and Rugby Academy of New Orleans. Mr. Lyon comes with very high commendations from his associates in school work, and the school authorities of this town and parish have a right to expect a high class of work from him.

The assistant teacher in the high school department, Mrs. K. K. Flanders, who is well known to the people of Covington, was for ten years one of the most successful teachers in New Orleans. She is a graduate of the McDonough No. 2 and the New Orleans High School and the New Orleans Normal school. For five years Mrs. Flanders was teacher in the Gayarre school and for her work's sake bears high testimonials from the New Orleans school authorities.

Miss Salome Seiler is too well known to our readers to need an introduction, having been for the past six years in her present position, and having always done her duty faithfully and well. She is a graduate of the Girl's High School No. 2, of New Orleans, and one of the best and most popular teachers in the parish. She will have the 7th grade this year.

Mrs. E. P. Sauter, who will again be in charge of the 6th grade, is another of the older members of the faculty of the school. A graduate of the New Orleans public, High and Normal schools, with 15 years experience in the school room, 10 years of which time was spent in the principalship of one of the best schools in New Orleans, should be guarantee enough for the confidence of the patrons of the Covington school that she will fill the position with credit to the school officials and the whole community.

Miss C. W. Mathews, who comes from the Alabama State Normal school and seven years successful work in the public schools of Mobile, will be in charge of the fifth grade. Miss Mathews proved her worth to the local school last year when, with 76 boys and girls enrolled in the room over which she presided, she made an enviable record for the thoroughness of her work.

Miss Olivia A. Mather, one of the new members of the Faculty, will have charge of the fourth grade this year. Miss Mather is a graduate of the public schools of Alexandria and of the Louisiana State Normal School, from the latter of which she graduated in 1905, since which time she has taught in the New Iberia High School. She comes with the highest commendations of the school authorities of Iberia parish.

Another of the new teachers who will this year enter the local school is Miss Nettie Brown, of Bastrop, La. She is a graduate of the Morehouse High school and of Peabody College for teachers and Vanderbilt University of Nashville, Tenn. Miss Brown is a teacher of elocution and physical culture of marked ability, and last year taught in the Lake Providence High School. She comes with the endorsement of some of the leading educators of the South. She has taught for four years in some of the best schools in the State.

Miss Elisia Stockton, who received her education in St. Joseph's College, of Bay St. Louis, Miss., and who has proven her ability as a teacher in this community, will again be in charge of the second grade. Like some of the other teachers of this school, Miss Stockton needs no introduction at our hands. Her continued success entitles her to the confidence of the patrons of the school.

Miss M. Louise Cases, who for the past two years has been in charge of the first grade, will be at her post again this year and may be expected to again do the same high grade of work of former years. She is a graduate of the public schools of West Baton Rouge parish, and of the State Normal School, of 1902. She is a young woman of fine character, who loves her work, is resourceful and kind, and whose pupils love her and learn under her direction.

Miss L. A. Huff, of Christiana, Tennessee, who will this year have charge of the lower primary work, is a primary teacher of experience, and according to the testimonials of some of the leading school members of this State, a woman of rare gifts and marked success. She is a graduate of Hermitage Institute of Christiana, Tenn., and of the Peabody College for teachers, and was last year primary teacher at Berwick, La.

Taken altogether, the local school has this year a very strong faculty, that will compare favorably with that of any similar school in the State.

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
