Mr. Smith reports having appointed Mr. Roehl a member of this committee. Further, that the books for the play have been ordered, the play is called "Down by the Sea."

Moved and seconded that the arrangement committee put an advertisement in both the local papers. Carried.

Capt. Alpuente has volunteered to take out the Fourth Troop of Cavalry in uniform rank.

Mr. Sudduth, of the Woodmen of the World, report that they would participate as a body, in uniform.

Moved and seconded that Mr. Jos. Elchinger be appointed Field Marshal for the day carried.

It was decided that the Chairman of the Arrangement Committee call on the Electric light people in regard to placing a limited number of drop lights out Gibson street from New Hampshire to Massachusetts streets.

It was decided that the merchant at Abita Springs, Mandeville, Madisonville and Houltonville be asked to put a float in this parade.

It was moved and seconded that the Contest Committee use their own discretion in advertising their contest. Carried.

ORDINANCE.

An ordinance defining, describing and establishing the corporate limits of the town of Covington, Louisiana.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Covington, Louisiana, in regular session convened, that the corporate limits of the Town be defined, described and established, as follows:

Commencing at the center of the steel bridge over the Bogue Falaya River, on the West Bank of said River, said bridge is situated in Boston street

continuing, thence following the meandering of the Bogue Falaya River down stream on the West Bank to the South line of New Covington, which line bounds fractional squares One (1) Two (2) and Three (3) of said Division of New Covington.

Thence following said line in a north-westerly direction to the Tchouffant River; thence following the meandering of said River on the northern side to a line west of Roosevelt street; said line being the western boundary of said Town of Covington; thence along the western boundary of that portion known as New Covington as shown by Map, to the Holmesville Road and across said Road; thence down said Road in a south-easterly direction to the subdivision known as Second Conolly.

Thence along the north side of Ninth street as shown by Map, to a Road known as Lee Ferry Road, which at this point is the north-western boundary of Sulphur Springs Addition, thence running northerly along the western side of the said Sulphur Springs Addition to the north-west corner of Square No. one (1) in said Addition, thence in an easterly direction along the north side of Squares one (1) and two (2) in said Addition to the Bogue Falaya River; thence down the said Bogue Falaya River, following its meanderings, on the west bank to the place of beginning.

This boundary embodies all of the subdivisions made at different times by different parties. Therefore the attached Map is made using these divisions and subdivisions and are connected by actual surveys.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the above metes, boundaries and lines be as above described and that any and all other previous lines accepted as the corporate limits, be repealed.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall go into effect from and after passage.

Moved by C. M. Foote, Jr. seconded by J. L. Smith, that the above Ordinance be adopted. Carried.

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance defining contempt of Court, and making it a misdemeanor for any one to talk in a loud voice, or in any way act in a disrespectful manner, or to tell an untruth, when testifying in any case before the Mayor's Court and disobeying the orders or mandates of the Mayor's Court, the town of Covington, La., and imposing a penalty for the violation thereof.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in legal session convened, that any person or persons while in the presence of the Mayor's Court during a session thereof who shall talk in a loud and vociferous voice, or who shall act in a disrespectful manner, or who shall tell an untruth while testifying, or who shall disobey the orders or mandates of the Mayor's Court, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in a sum not to exceed Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars or to be imprisoned for a period not to exceed six (6) months in jail subject to work on the public roads of the Town of Covington, La., or both at the discretion of the Mayor's Court.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that this Ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage.

Moved by Mr. Lacroix, and seconded by Mr. Poole that the above ordinance be adopted. Carried.

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance authorizing the Improvement Committee of the Town of Covington, La., to order the tearing down, demolishing and removing of all buildings, houses, sheds, etc., in the Town of Covington, La., which are dangerous to life and limb of passers by.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in regular session convened, that the Improvement Committee is hereby authorized to have demolished, torn down and removed all buildings, houses, sheds, etc., which are in such a condition as to be a menace to passers by, or to endanger the life and limbs of passers by.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that any person or persons being so ordered by the Improvement Committee to demolish, tear down and remove said buildings, houses, sheds, etc., shall begin said work within a period of ten (10) days after having received such notice in writing; and in the event of failure to comply with the orders of the Improvement Committee, said person or persons, failing to do so, shall be fined in a sum not to exceed Five (\$5.00) Dollars, or imprisoned not to exceed thirty (30) days, and each day of such failure shall constitute a new offense, in the meaning of this Ordinance.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that any and all laws conflicting with this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Moved by Mr. Poole, seconded by Mr. Lacroix, that the above ordinance be adopted. Carried.

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance making it a misdemeanor for any person or persons to escape from prison or absent himself from the Town of Covington, La., when on parole, and fixing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in legal session convened, that any person or persons while in the presence of the Mayor's Court during a session thereof who shall talk in a loud and vociferous voice, or who shall act in a disrespectful manner, or who shall tell an untruth while testifying, or who shall disobey the orders or mandates of the Mayor's Court, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in a sum not to exceed Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars or to be imprisoned for a period not to exceed six (6) months in jail subject to work on the public roads of the Town of Covington, La., or both at the discretion of the Mayor's Court.

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Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that any person or persons being so ordered by the Improvement Committee to demolish, tear down and remove said buildings, houses, sheds, etc., shall begin said work within a period of ten (10) days after having received such notice in writing; and in the event of failure to comply with the orders of the Improvement Committee, said person or persons, failing to do so, shall be fined in a sum not to exceed Five (\$5.00) Dollars, or imprisoned not to exceed thirty (30) days, and each day of such failure shall constitute a new offense, in the meaning of this Ordinance.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in legal session convened, that any person or persons while in the presence of the Mayor's Court during a session thereof who shall talk in a loud and vociferous voice, or who shall act in a disrespectful manner, or who shall tell an untruth while testifying, or who shall disobey the orders or mandates of the Mayor's Court, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in a sum not to exceed Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars or to be imprisoned for a period not to exceed six (6) months in jail subject to work on the public roads of the Town of Covington, La., or both at the discretion of the Mayor's Court.

and Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in legal session convened, that any person or persons guilty of breaking jail or escaping while doing duty on the public streets of the Town of Covington, La., or skipping a parole when released thereunder, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, on conviction thereon, shall be fined in a sum not to exceed Fifty (\$50.00) dollars or imprisonment, subject to work on the public streets of the Town of Covington, La., for a period not exceeding six months, or both, at the discretion of the Mayor's Court.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

Moved by Mr. Lacroix, seconded by Mr. Smith that the above ordinance be adopted. Carried.

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance to prevent spitting or expectorating in public buildings, halls, side-walks, etc., and imposing a penalty for the violation of the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in legal session convened, That it is hereby deemed unlawful for any person or persons to spit or expectorate in any public building, hall or side-walk, etc., in the Town of Covington, La.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that any person or persons found guilty and convicted for the violation of this Act, shall be fined in a sum not to exceed Twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars or imprisonment, subject to work on the public roads of the Town of Covington, La., for a period not to exceed sixty days, or both, at the discretion of the Mayor.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

Moved by Mr. Lacroix, seconded by Mr. Smith that the above ordinance be adopted. Carried.

AN ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance authorizing the Board of Health of the Town of Covington, La., to inspect all tanks, cisterns, etc., within the corporate limits of the Town of Covington, La., and ordering the cleaning, screening and covering, etc., of all such tanks, cisterns, etc., and to determine the method and manner of doing such work.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in legal session convened that the Board of Health is hereby granted the power to order all cisterns, tanks, etc., within the corporate limits of the Town of Covington, La., to be cleaned out at any time that they may seem fit and to order the screening and covering of all such tanks, cisterns, etc., or enclose them in such a way as to best preserve the health of the inhabitants of said Town, where the water in said tank, cistern, etc., is used for drinking purposes.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that any person or persons failing to comply with the orders from the Board of Health shall upon refusal, be reported to the Secretary of the Town, who shall immediately file an affidavit against him or her so refusing, and the said person or persons shall be ordered before the Mayor to stand trial, and if found guilty of having refused to comply with the orders of the Board of Health, said person or persons shall be tried for the crime of misdemeanor of contempt of Court, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined or imprisoned in accordance with the Ordinance on this subject.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage.

Moved by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Lacroix that the above ordinance be adopted. Carried.

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance granting to the St. Tammany & New Orleans Railways & Ferry Co., the right to lay trucks or tramways along the streets of the Town of Covington, La., and defining the requirements of such work by the Town of Covington, La.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., in legal session convened, that the St. Tammany & New Orleans Railways & Ferry Co., is hereby granted the right to lay their railway tracks in the Town of Covington, La., as follows:

Entering the corporate limits of the Town of Covington on the west bank or to be imprisoned for a period not to exceed six (6) months in jail subject to work on the public roads of the Town of Covington, La., or both at the discretion of the Mayor's Court.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that this Ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage.

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Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that any person or persons being so ordered by the Improvement Committee to demolish, tear down and remove said buildings, houses, sheds, etc., shall begin said work within a period of ten (10) days after having received such notice in writing; and in the event of failure to comply with the orders of the Improvement Committee, said person or persons, failing to do so, shall be fined in a sum not to exceed Five (\$5.00) Dollars, or imprisoned not to exceed thirty (30) days, and each day of such failure shall constitute a new offense, in the meaning of this Ordinance.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that any and all laws conflicting with this ordinance, are hereby repealed.
