Effective November 1st, 1908, the offices of N. G. Pearsall, General Manager, and J. H. O'Donnell, Car Accountant, will be moved to Bogalusa, Washington Parish, Louisiana, and all communications should be addressed to that point instead of Covington, Louisiana, as heretofore.
