A TERRIBLE TRAIN WRECK.
 Many Killed and Injured, Among Whom are Prominent Citizens of Slidell, Pearl River and Other Towns in St. Tammany.

The following account of the wreck is taken from the Picayune: "The Northeastern train had stopped at Little Woods, taken on three or four passengers, and was just getting under way. According to witnesses, there was a heavy fog, and in addition Engineer W. A. Blackburn of the Great Northern train was busy conversing in his cab with Emile Heintz, also an engineer on the Great Northern, who was riding to the city on the Great Northern engine with Engineer Blackburn and Fireman Peter McCarthy.

"The Northeastern train consisted of two empty 'dead head' passenger coaches in the rear, a white coach, a combination white and colored coach and a baggage car. The Great Northern train carried its usual equipment of baggage, two passenger coaches and parlor car.

"The Great Northern's engine struck the rear-most empty passenger coach with such terrible force that the engine drove itself under the coach roof almost to the front end of the car. Fireman Peter McCarthy, evidently the first of the Great Northern's crew to see the Northeastern train, jumped from the cab a few seconds before the impact. E. Heintz, the engineer with whom Engineer Blackburn was said to be conversing, also saw the Northeastern train before the impact, and is said to have literally tumbled out of the cab. Both he and McCarthy were injured by their falls. Blackburn saw the Northeastern train a second or two before it was struck, and had time to reverse the lever, but no time to jump. In consequence he was carried with his engine as it ripped the empty passenger coach in two, but miraculously escaped injury.

"The second empty passenger coach, known as coach No. 230, driven by the terrible force of the collision, crashed into the rear end of passenger coach No. 343, in which there were twelve passengers. Caught between the coach No. 230, which acted as a battering ram, and the front passenger coach, known as coach No. 259 was literally ground to pieces, and coach No. 230, shot still further ahead, and did not stop until it had half telescoped coach 259, the foremost coach.

"It was in coach No. 243 that the terrible slaughter occurred. Of the ten or twelve persons known to have been in that coach only two or three escaped with their lives. The others were mangled that they died without knowing what had occurred.

"Among the survivors of the car of death were Mrs. F. M. Attaway, of Slidell, La., and her 5-months-old child, Mary, one of the two children with her. The other child, William, aged 3 years, was instantly killed. A similar fate would have been encountered by the infant child but for the merest accident. When the child and mother were taken from the debris it was found that a heavy piece of timber had lodged just back of the infant, and had propped-like splinters and pieces of jagged iron into which the coach had been ground.

Another occupant of the 'car of death' who was mangled almost beyond recognition was Prof. C. E. Roos, formerly of Pennsylvania, but recently a professor in New Orleans University. His skull was crushed and almost every bone in his body was broken. It was with difficulty that the rescuers repressed their horror sufficiently to remove the shapeless body and lay it beside the others on the ground.

There was but one physician among the passengers, Dr. J. F. Pigott, of Covington, who worked nobly for the suffering and maimed unfortunates, and was assisted by E. J. Frederick, J. S. Jones, Mr. Oplatek, of the drug firm of Trouilly & Oplatek, and others whose names we do not know. Mr. Jake Salmen, of Slidell, was one of the first among the injured who received attention from Dr. Pigott.
