 The following license ordinance was adopted:
LICENSE ORDINANCE.
 Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, in legal session, convened, that a license tax be and is hereby levied for the year 1909 upon each person, corporation, firm or association pursuing any occupation, business, trade or calling in the town of Covington, La., which is subject to State license.
 Sec. 2. Be it ordained, etc., that the amount of license due this town for each occupation, business, trade or calling carried on or conducted in this town subject to a license, is hereby fixed at the same as is now levied and collected by the State for each occupation, business, trade or calling within the corporate limits of this town, except the liquor license, which shall be five hundred \$500.00 dollars for the year 1909.
 Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that the license due this town shall be and is hereby due and collectible at the same time and in the same manner as licenses due the State, and in the event the same are not paid when due, it is ordered that the Tax Collector report the same
