A GRAND MOVE

A PROJECT BY WHICH THE SOUTH'S RESOURCES CAN BE STUDIED FROM THE CAPITAL CITY.

Montgomery, Ala., Dec. 20.—That the clarion call to the Southland, awakening it to a new era of industrial and commercial progress, has been sounded through the recent Southern Commercial Congress is the opinion expressed by G. Grosvenor Dawe, Director General of the Changes. Mr. Dawe, in an interview with a representative of the Associated Press to-day, said:

"The record of the week in relation to the idea of a \$1,000,000 endowment fund for the Southern Commercial Congress is that hundreds of men who have returned to their homes in the South have discussed it in private and in print; that the New Orleans Progressive Union has emphatically endorsed the idea; that the Commercial Club of Montgomery has not only endorsed the idea, but is ready with its \$1,000 contribution, and that three of us had an entire day's consultation in New Orleans with John M. Parker, President of the Congress. Our meeting was for the purpose of preparing a statement to be shortly made through the Executive Committee.

"The Southern Commercial Congress was a stupendous project with a complex purpose. It was designed to make the South know itself; to make the South know and to utilize the most fitting moment for such a congress that has ever occurred in American history.

"The spirit of the Congress was not to stir up animosity, but simply to declare that the South; with its possessions, needed development in order to bring the nation to its proper development. The clarion call of the Congress to the men of the South was for them to live for the South, because the nation needs a greater South.

"The Congress was a sane, sound idea, worked out on broad lines at the right time and the right place, and it is doubtful whether in the commercial history of the United States there has been any meeting that fired so strongly the imagination of those who came under its influence. Why was this? Because we who are interested in the commercial development of the South have hitherto met with much disappointment in our work. We hold our meetings in our various communities; we read great articles as true as they are great; we prophecy great things, and then the greater number of the great things do not come. But when we saw it was possible for a few men on fire with a right idea to occupy the center of the American stage for two days and to hold the interest for several, we all realized that the thing lacking hitherto had been co-operation and courage.

"Hence the stupendous plan of the Congress naturally led eager and able minds to evolve a still more stupendous plan, and one that is just as sound and as sane, but which could not have been possible except as an outgrowth of the Congress which suggested it. The project is a great office building and auditorium in Washington, a city in which no satisfactory public auditorium can be found and in which office room is at a premium. This great building will be the home of a persistent Southern propaganda at home and abroad, and its rentals will be devoted to the furtherance of all commercial projects in the South that will aid in bringing that section into a party of development with the rest of the United States. It will also be the home of the Southern Club.

"There will be maintained there an exposition of resources arranged in such a way as to bring immediate results. Instead of a museum arrangement, the effort will be towards special studies, each great resource of the South being assigned to a room. Thus a man wishing to understand iron conditions could by means learn the location of every known ore bed, the location of every furnace, the relation of transportation to the bed, and, by glancing at the records, learn what properties were undeveloped or that needed additional capital. Any and everything that would give light on the subject of iron and steel would be there; analysis, distance from fluxing material, etc.

"In a room devoted to health conditions would be the great facts of the South's advancing sanitation, thus demonstrating the pettiness of present fears as to the South. With similar perfection of detail the whole project would be carried out, and those of us who have our hearts in this matter feel confident that such a co-operative move will accelerate enormously the great development that has already come to the South.

"We are fully aware that many men for many years have rendered
