After leaving Slidell at 3:15, Nov. 30, reached Natchitoches at 7:30 p. m. Dec. 1. Was entertained by Dr. J. W. Heckert, Prof. of Methods in Normal.

The conference of parish delegates was called at 10 a. m. Dec. 2. St. Tammany had two organizations to report. The different representatives reported the work done in their various parishes. A delightful lunch was served by the Normal Club.

Afterwards an organization was gone into and called the State School Improvement League. All ladies interested in school work are entitled to membership by paying the necessary fee of \$1 00 per year. That night a musical was tendered the delegates. Each delegate was appointed parish organizer for their home parish. Mrs. Crichlow reports a splendid time and is anxious to see St. Tammany in the lead in this movement. She pledged \$10 00 for the prize fund for the parish. This fund is to be given for improvements in rural schools.

The Slidell District Teachers' Association met in the High School Building, in Slidell, Dec. 19, 1908. The meeting was opened by singing America, and Mr. Evans led in prayer. The following program was then taken up after the roll call. "Opening exercises for rural schools" by Miss Upton, who then read a poem entitled "Christmas" by Irving. They then discussed the great truths that can be appropriately brought out in December, concluding by telling the beautiful story of the birth of our divine Savior, Christ. Arbor Day was then taken up and Miss Benson outlined the subject, then called on the following to discuss the subjects assigned them.

"History of Arbor Day," Mrs. Crichlow, "Varieties of trees in Louisiana, and on our farms," Miss Mullings; "Trees and their relations to birds," Miss Harris; "The most useful trees," Miss Upton; "The best trees to plant," Miss Hughes; "How to plant trees and how to care for them," Miss Simpson; "Best trees to plant on the roadside," Miss Lane; "Best trees and shrubs for the home lawns," Miss Parker; "School houses, what they are and what they should be," Miss Beane; "school grounds how to improve them," Miss Rawlings; How to do away with rubbish on the roadside, and world's great forest," Mr. Evans. Next came the Superintendent's critique. The meeting then adjourned for lunch. Afternoon Miss Beane discussed a picture study. Mrs. Crichlow gave a description of her trip to the conference for the organizing of a State School Improvement League, stating her appointment as parish organizer. Miss Harris discussed the Geographic Influence in American History, the mines and forests of the mountains. Then came the assignments of work for the next meeting as follows: Morning, opening exercises, Mrs. Hughes; Beautifying the school grounds," Prof. Crichlow; "De-

partment meeting leader," Mrs. Crichlow; "Model language lessons for second grades, Miss Rawlings; "Geographic influence in American history," Miss Harris. Afternoon, "Singing or study of picture," Miss Mullings; "Dynamic factors in education," R. S. Crichlow, "The teacher at work," Miss Lane; "School hygiene and sanitary drinking cups," Drs. P. R. Outlaw and J. F. Polk.
