It was moved by Mr. E. J. Frederick seconded by Mr. W. A. Hood, that the following resolution be adopted.

Be it resolved by the Town Council of the Town of Covington in legal session convened, That Geo. A. Strain, Frank J. Norman, Segond & Frederick, Coltra & Herbez, W. E. Parker, C. Beck, Beaucoudray Bros., N. J. Seiler, Southern Hotel Co., Auguste J. Planche, W. R. Badon, J. H. Heintz, Chas. J. Galouye, B. Labat and W. N. Patrick, having complied with the provisions of Act 176, of 1908, known as the Sixty-sixth Bill, they are hereby granted the right to conduct and operate a saloon in the Town of Covington, La., at the places mentioned in their applications.

Be it further resolved, etc. That this resolution shall be applicant's warrant to obtain a license for such business, after paying for such license according to the classification contained in said act.
