**ORDINANCE No. 95.**  
 An Ordinance granting to James T. Plant, Thos. J. Hand, David J. Ramalle, Frank Roach, Charles L. Baker, James M. Currie and Jacob Levy the right to operate, conduct or carry on a saloon or liquor exchange business in the Town of Slidell, Louisiana, and the selling of malt, vinous or spirituous liquors.  
 Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Slidell, Louisiana, in legal session this 12th day of January, 1909, that named parties, residents of the Town of Slidell Louisiana, are hereby given and granted the right to operate a saloon or liquor exchange within the limits of the Town of Slidell, Louisiana, at the different places named below, according to their respective petitions, which have been filed with this Board of Aldermen for more than three (3) weeks, of which filing public notice has been given in the Covington News, the official journal of the Town of Slidell and to sell, vinous or spirituous liquors.  
 James T. Plant is given permission to conduct a barroom in the name of the Slidell Liquor Company on the premises now occupied by the Slidell Liquor Company, facing First Street on the block bounded on the north by Fremont Avenue, on the south by Franklin Avenue, and premises adjoining the Commercial Hotel on the south.  
 Thomas J. Hand is granted permission to conduct a liquor exchange in the name of Pickett & Hand, which is the lot on the west side of the N. O. & N. E. R. R., being lot No. 6, in Section 10, Abita Bayou Street.  
 David J. Ramalle is granted permission to conduct a barroom on the premises now occupied by Harry Boyce's Saloon, across from the N. O. & N. E. Depot on First Street.  
 Frank Roach is granted permission to conduct a barroom on the premises now occupied by him at the corner of Carey and Robert Streets.  
 Charles L. Baker is granted permission to conduct a barroom on the premises now occupied by him across from the N. O. & N. E. R. R. Depot, on the lot 5, between Carey and Robert Streets, just opposite of the Bank of Slidell.
