It is reported that parties interested in the manufacture of glass have examined specimens of sand around Covington and found it well adapted to the purpose, and that it is probable a factory will be established here.

Monroe Jenkins, who was shot by Leonard Cassells, was taken to New Orleans Tuesday to be operated on in an effort to remove the bullet which remained somewhere inside his skull, is dead, having failed to survive the operation. The Jones & Pickett Co. Ltd., Dr. C. Z. Williams, Thomas Parker, and Warren Thomas have sold 10,000 acres of hardwood timber land to Chicago syndicate, and L. C. Black, of Cincinnati, also 11,000 acres to the same company. Land is situated in Pearl River and Bogue Chitto swamps.

Slidell, La. January 12th, 1909. ORDINANCE. An Ordinance granting to James T. Plant, Thomas J. Hand, David J. Kamalie, Frank Koch, Charles L. Baker, James M. Currie and Jacob Levy the right to operate, conduct and hold a saloon or liquor exchange business in the Town of Slidell, Louisiana, and the selling of malted barley.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Slidell, Louisiana, in that session convening, that the following named parties, residents of the Town of Slidell, Louisiana, are hereby given and granted the right to operate, conduct and hold a saloon or liquor exchange business in the Town of Slidell, Louisiana, subject to the terms and conditions set forth in their respective petitions, which have been filed with this Board of Aldermen for that purpose, to-wit: James T. Plant, Thomas J. Hand, David J. Kamalie, Frank Koch, Charles L. Baker, James M. Currie and Jacob Levy.
