The Pineland, the handsome steamer that is to make the New Orleans trip of the St. Tammany and New Orleans Railway and Ferry Company over the Lake, is being fitted with larger propellers so that she will be able to make twenty miles an hour. She now makes sixteen. She will probably be running next week.

The New Orleans Great Northern morning train from New Orleans was delayed in reaching Covington until 4:30 p. m. Monday, just in time to make the return trip from Covington. The delay was caused by a couple of wheels on the tender being derailed between Slidell and Mandeville. There was no damage beyond loss of time.

Capt. A. J. Alpuente last Monday tendered his resignation as Captain of Troop C, First Squadron Cavalry to Adjutant General Stafford, as have also the following officers and members: Sergeant, Ernest Buegers; Corporal, J. The withdrawal of these members of the troop will greatly weaken the organization and it is to be very much regretted, in view of the fact that bringing it to a state of perfection which was a pride to Covington, and also in view of the fact that it will be compelled to enter the Carnival parade in a weakened condition and at a time when its full strength should have been proudly displayed to the many visitors. It is to be hoped that it will eventually rebuild itself and not drift into disorganization. It is a useful body, whose functions can hardly be carried out by any other organization. We hope to see a revival of interest in the troop and its restoration to its old standing.

CARNIVAL NEWS.

The near approach of His Majesty's arrival has awakened the deepest interest throughout the Kingdom. Preparations are being made by all classes and in all departments to make his reception and sojourn in Covington one of the grandest demonstrations of the art of decoration that have ever before been equalled in Covington, and it is said that the floats to be entered by Abita Springs have been prepared with the greatest care and are worthy of the occasion.

The grand mask ball will be at Cantrell's Hall in the evening, the admission to which has been fixed at 25 cents.

There will be an Unmasking Committee, with authority to remove masks, if desired, in order that no objectionable person may gain admittance to the hall.

The queen will occupy a throne on the gallery of the Southern Hotel, from which she will witness the parade.

The line of march for the parade will be Jackson street to New Hampshire, New Hampshire to Rutland, Rutland to Columbia, Columbia to Kirkland, Kirkland to New Hampshire, New Hampshire to Boston, where the queen will be saluted in her throne at the Southern, thence to Vermont street and to the park.

There will be a meeting of the maskers who are to take part in the parade at the Southern Hotel at 5:30 p. m. Sunday.

Order of Election.

Whereas the Mayor and Council of the Town of Covington, did at a regular meeting held on the 2d day of February 1909, ordained that a special election be held in the said Town of Covington, La., on the 23d day of March, and did request the Board of Supervisors of the Parish of St. Tammany to supervise said election, to appoint commissioners and clerks to serve at said election and to give due notice of said appointments, and of the time and place of holding said election, and to make return of the results of said election to said Mayor and Town Council.

Now, therefore, we, the Board of Supervisors of Election in and for the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, duly commissioned, sworn and qualified, by virtue of the authority in us vested, and pursuant to the request aforesaid, do hereby give public notice that on the 23d day of March 1909, a special election will be held at the City Hall and Mayor's Court in the said Town of Covington, for the purpose of taking the sense of the majority of the voters of the Town of Covington, entitled to vote under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, upon the question of issuing bonds in the sum of Forty Thousand (\$40,000) Dollars, which bonds shall be numbered serially from one to forty inclusive, and which bonds shall be made payable ten years after their date, as is set forth in an Ordinance passed by the Town Council on the 2d day of February 1909, and in pursuance of said Ordinance and the requests of the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, and in the law vesting us with certain powers, we, the Board of Supervisors of Election for the Parish of St. Tammany, do hereby name and appoint the following commissioners and Clerk to preside and serve at said Election on said date, to-wit: John E. Smith, S. D. Bulloch and Emile Frederick, Commissioners, and W. L. Fussell, Clerk.

Said Commissioners and Clerk are hereby instructed to open the poles at seven o'clock a. m. and to close the same at six o'clock p. m. on the day of said election as required by law, and after the said poles have been closed to count the said votes cast in favor of said issuance of said bonds and against the issuance of said bonds, and to make return thereof to the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Covington, La., and to Lewis L. Morgan, President of the Board of Supervisors.

The strains of Mendelssohn's wedding march, at 5 o'clock announced the entrance of the bridal procession.

The bride was given away by her father, the bride-groom awaiting her with his best man, Mr. Wm. Koopp.

The bride's maids were Misses Louise Koopp and Rose Oulliber, their costumes of the princess period, were beautiful. The bride wore a gown of Valenciennes over satin and wore a diadem of sash. The long tulle veil fell from a half wreath of orange blossoms that rested on her soft black hair, a shower bouquet of lilies of the valley and asparagus completed the lovely costume.

During the ceremony Miss Janie Canuel gave a delightful organ recital, and the beautiful hymn "Ave Maria" was sung by the choir.

Immediately after the ceremony supper was served at the bride's home, and a large reception was held at the U. F. B. A. Hall, where dancing was enjoyed till a late hour.

Knights of Columbus

The institution of a Council of the Knights of Columbus in Covington, in which Dr. F. Buquoi and others have been greatly interested for some time, was brought to Covington last Sunday three excursion trains, two from New Orleans and one from Baton Rouge, filled with people from these and intermediate points, and pouring into Covington eight or nine hundred visitors, many of whom had never been here before.

Dr. Buquoi was assisted in receiving the Knights by Messrs. Joe and Felix Duggas and Miss Lily Allain, Mrs. B. W. Warren, Mrs. John Foley, Mrs. Wallace Poole and others.

The train from Baton Rouge over the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern was composed of four coaches and a baggage car. It arrived at 10 a. m. and was in charge of L. P. Amis, J. F. Grouchy, J. A. Landry, A. Persac, Arrangement Committee of Baton Rouge Council of Knights. This train carried 100 Knights from Baton Rouge and twenty-five from Plaquemine and about ninety other passengers.

The Illinois central train from New Orleans, which came by way of Baton Rouge over the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern Road arrived at 10:10 a. m. and made the trip from New Orleans in two hours and thirty minutes. This train had one baggage car, two coaches and two Pullman sleepers, the first that have ever been in Covington. It was in charge of the Transportation Committee of the New Orleans Council, W. R. Metzler, T. A. Russell, T. Byrne, W. J. Schreiber, C. J. Reiley and P. O'Brien.

The N. O. G. N. excursion got in at 11 a. m., bringing seven coaches, a baggage car and a Pullman sleeper, and carried a large number of passengers.
