Do the people of Covington know that there are but two higher grade postoffices than Covington in the State? They are New Orleans and Shreveport.  
 It may also be a surprise to learn that notwithstanding the prevailing opinion that business has been much duller this year than last, our postoffice has transacted more business this year. There have been received at this office 780 registered letters, while 1897 have been dispatched from this office the past three months, and the other business of the office has been unusually large.

As the roadbed settles the St. Tammany Railway Co. is leveling all uneven places and pulling the roadbed in as smooth as condition as possible. This is a trouble incident to all new roads and disappears as soon as the bed has settled sufficient to maintain a permanently level condition. The company will erect stations along its line for the shelter and convenience of patrons.  
 There will be no reduced round trip tickets to New Orleans. The boats will charge 50 cents each way between New Orleans and Mandeville and the Railway Company 40 cents from Covington to Mandeville, 50 cents round trip.
