Charter
 of the
 THE FOLSOM EXPORT LUMBER CO. LTD.

United States of America,
 Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana.
 Be it known that on this 16th day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand, nine hundred and nine, and of the independence of the United States of America the hundred and fourth; before me, Edward H. Richard, a notary public, and for the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, the following named and undersigned persons came and appeared, and undersigned names are hereto subscribed, all of full age, legal capacity, and availing themselves of the provisions of the laws relative to the organization of corporations, they have covenanted and agreed to be bound by the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, and to be incorporated and to be a body politic in law, for the purpose and objects and under the stipulations, articles and conditions following to-wit:

Article I.
 The name and style of this corporation shall be THE FOLSOM EXPORT LUMBER COMPANY, LIMITED, and by that name, it shall have power and authority to exist and enjoy succession for the full term and period of ninety years from date hereof, unless sooner dissolved.

Article II.
 The domicile of this corporation shall be in the town of Folsom, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana. All citations and other legal process shall be served upon the President, or in case of his absence or inability, act upon the Vice President. The President shall be the executive officer of the corporation and shall preside at the meetings of the Board of Directors and Stockholders.

Article III.
 The objects and purposes for which this corporation is established and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be:

To buy or sell, own, operate, run, manage, lease, hire or rent saw mills; to buy and sell lumber in its manufactured state, timber, lumber lands, lands, etc.; to construct and maintain roads for the furthering of the purposes for which this corporation is established, and to do all acts necessary and proper, and carrying on of a general saw mill and lumber export business, although such acts may not be enumerated herein.

Article IV.
 This corporation may sue or be sued in its corporate name, make and use a corporate seal, the same to break and alter at pleasure; have, receive, purchase, convey, sell, mortgage, hypothecate, pledge, lease, sub-lease, and convey and receive real and personal property, and make and establish such by-laws, rules and regulations as may be necessary, and same to alter and change at pleasure; and shall possess the rights and privileges to which corporations are or may be authorized and entitled to possess.

Article V.
 This corporation may exercise its corporate powers within any other State or Territory of the Union.
 The capital stock of said corporation shall be ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars, divided into and represented by one hundred shares of the sum of one hundred (\$100) dollars each. Said stock shall be paid for in cash at the time of subscription, or in installments, to be issued at not less than par, in payment of exchange for property or rights actually received or purchased by said corporation, or the same may be issued full paid, for money advanced and for such other valuable consideration or service as the Board of Directors of said corporation may determine, provided that no stock shall be issued until consideration therefor has been received by said corporation. Said stock shall be signed by the President and Secretary of said corporation.

Article VI.
 At all elections by or meetings of the stockholders, each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote to be cast by the person whose name the stock appears on the books of the corporation, or by his agent or proxy, duly authorized to that effect in writing. This corporation to become a going concern as soon as the sum of three thousand and five hundred dollars is subscribed for and paid in.
 No stockholder shall have authority or right to sell or otherwise dispose of his stock, whole or in part, without first giving the Board of Directors fifteen days notice in writing of his intention to that effect in writing. This corporation to become a going concern as soon as the sum of three thousand and five hundred dollars is subscribed for and paid in.

Article VII.
 The by-laws, affairs and corporate powers of this corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors to be composed of three stockholders. No person shall be eligible as a Director or officer as herein provided in this charter, who is not a stockholder in this corporation. The members of the Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority of the votes of the stockholders cast at a meeting to be held for that purpose, to be called at the following named persons shall constitute the first Board of Directors: Geo. D. Cantrelle, J. H. Cassels and William P. Cantrelle. Said Board shall continue in office until March 1910, on the first Monday thereafter, or until their successors are elected. On which date and thereafter annually, an election for directors shall be held at the office of the corporation, at Folsom, in the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, after fifteen days notice the said shall have been given by publication in one of the newspapers published in the Parish of St. Tammany, by two publications thereof during said time.

A failure to elect directors on the date above mentioned, shall not dissolve this corporation, the existing Board of Directors shall continue to hold office, and another election shall be held as soon thereafter as practicable, of which notice shall be given in the manner already provided for, notice of meeting.

Every Board of Directors shall elect a President, Vice President and a Treasurer, who shall also be the Secretary, from among their own number.
 All vacancies as herein created shall be filled for the ensuing year as follows: Geo. D. Cantrelle, President; J. H. Cassels, Vice-President; and Wm. P. Cantrelle, Secretary-Treasurer.

Article VIII.
 Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors, for any cause, shall be filled by the remaining members of the Board of Directors from among the stockholders of the corporation. Two members of the Board shall constitute a quorum thereof, unless otherwise provided by the Board of Directors at pleasure. The Board of Directors shall make such by-laws, rules and regulations as they think necessary, and shall have full power, at pleasure, to name and appoint other officers and employees and fix their salaries, and to employ and discharge such officers and employees, with the right to dismiss them at said Board's pleasure. And said Board shall have the right to determine and fix the salaries and duties of the several officers herein provided for, and to assign other duties to said officers as will best serve the interest and welfare of the corporation. They shall also have the power to sell, convey, mortgage, pledge, lease, sub-lease and otherwise dispose of all real and personal, personal and mixed, borrow and lend money, and to do all things which may be necessary to properly transact and manage the business of the corporation.

Article IX.
 This act of incorporation may be changed, modified or amended, or this corporation may be dissolved with the assent of a majority of the amount of stock present or represented at a general meeting of the stockholders of said corporation, and convened for such purpose, after 30 days previous notice for such meeting shall have been given by two publications in one of the newspapers published in the Parish of St. Tammany by four publications during said time. Whenever this corporation is dissolved, either by limitation or from any other cause, its affairs shall be liquidated under the supervision of three commissioners chosen for that purpose from among the stockholders by a majority in amount of the stockholders as above set forth in this article.

Article X.
 In the event of the death of any of said commissioners, the survivors shall continue to act. No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or debts of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares subscribed for or owned by him, nor shall any liability in organization have the effect of

rendering this charter null, or exposing a stockholder to any liability beyond the unpaid balance, if any, of his stock.
