**School Board.**  
 Covington, La., April 17, 1909.  
 The Parish School Board met on the above date with the following members present: John Engelhardt, T. J. O'Keefe, Dr. J. F. Pigott, Chas. A. David, W. H. Kahl, H. Q. Parker, John H. Davis, T. P. Crawford and W. E. Gause.

After roll call, the minutes of the previous meeting were read, and approved as read.  
 Moved by Mr. Gause and seconded by Mr. Davis that Mr. Lancaster be employed to assist the superintendent in checking up the books of the superintendent so as to ascertain the financial condition of the wards relative to each other. Carried.  
 Moved by Mr. Gause and seconded by Mr. Kahl that Mr. Gause be allowed to use the \$401.50 to pay the teachers of the Slidell High School, which was appropriated for that purpose by the State Board. Carried.  
 Moved by Mr. Gause and seconded by Mr. Crawford that all the schools in the parish close with the month ending April 16, 1909. Carried.

Moved by Dr. Pigott and seconded by Mr. Kahl that the teachers be paid for attending the monthly institutes. Carried.  
 The discussion of the financial condition of the schools consumed a great deal of time. The report of the superintendent showed there was not sufficient funds in the bank to pay the teachers for the month of March. In his supplementary report showed that \$3000 must be raised to pay the teachers up to April 16, 1909, and meet current expenses. The proposition of borrowing the necessary \$3000 was taken up. Mr. Ellis, of the St. Tammany Banking Company and Savings Bank was called in and asked to state on what conditions his bank would loan the board the required amount. He stated the conditions, which were these: The board must sign a personal note before the bank would loan them the money. The proposition was accepted and the money was secured for the teachers.

Dr. J. F. Pigott recommended the following named trustees for the Ramsay School: E. R. Greenlaw, L. Z. Dickey and A. H. Page. For the Covington Colored School: Otis Reme, Richard Merritt and J. S. Tyner.  
 Mr. H. Q. Parker recommended for the Dixon Crawford School the following named trustees: C. G. Talley, George O'Berry and L. W. Crawford.  
 Mr. Engelhardt recommended for the Madisonville School the following named trustees: Geo. R. Dutch, Ben Guelone, Victor Chatterlier, Ed. Huen and E. Mugnier. For the Koopp School: George Koopp, Jr., and Alfred Gitz. For the Edwards School: Geo. Edwards and Ernest Goodbee. For the Sam Hill School: Rube Bennett and John Godshaw.

All the above trustees were approved by the board. The board adjourned to meet at the call of the president.
