Ament the Electric Road

Editor St. Tammany Farmer:
 Something should be done, by the people of Covington and Abita to induce the boats plying to Mandeville and the St. Tammany and New Orleans Railways and Ferry Company to make routes from New Orleans to Covington and Abita which will insure these towns some of the benefit from the boat traffic from New Orleans and the railroad traffic from Mandeville. Under present conditions nine out of every ten excursionists by boat from New Orleans lay over in Mandeville on account of the differential of 50c in favor of that town. If the combined rates of the boats and of the St. Tammany and New Orleans R. R. Company were to equal the fare of the New Orleans and Great Northern R. R. Co., many more excursionists would come to Covington and Abita than is now the case.

The Fire.

At 10:45 a. m. Monday the fire alarm called the department to the Southern Hotel to extinguish a fire that occurred in the engine room. The building is a one-story brick structure separated from the main building by a small yard. The firemen reached the engine room by way of the alley running between Poole Brothers livery stable and Meek & McCormack's store. The roof of the engine room was of tar composition, sealed inside with zinc, and the fire originated between this zinc and the roofing. The place was made it very difficult to breathe or see, and a hole was cut in the roof to let the smoke out before anything could be seen on the inside of the building. Police surman B. A. Schneider, of the fire department, was attending a meeting of the Police Jury, was one of the first on the roof and worked like a Trojan. In consequence he is out a suit of clothes and

a new Stetson hat. The flames were quickly extinguished and the damage is slight and covered by insurance, but the fire is one of the most unfortunate we have had in Covington, resulting in the serious injury of Frank Boudousque, one of our most popular young men and member of the Fire Department. Mr. Boudousque had taken charge of one of the portable fire extinguishers and after charging it rushed through the doorway into the building, striking the excited president of the door casing as he passed. Expecting to reach the fire quickly he had failed to turn open the nozzle and the jolting blow caused the 250 pound pressure to explode the tank. The concussion severely bruised his forehead. He was caught as he fell by Mr. Fontaine Poole and Mr. H. R. Warren, who carried his insensible body into a room in the Southern Hotel. Dr. Gautreaux was called in and gave him medical attention, pronouncing his injuries serious. Rev. Father Koopert was called to the bedside and administered religious consolation. Only Mrs. Boudousque and members of the family were allowed in the room, and it was rumored that Mr. Boudousque's injuries were fatal. Later in the day, however, news was received that the vomiting of blood had ceased and that the patient had been able to retain a glass of milk, with indications of improvement in his condition. Mrs. Carrie Rousseau, a practical trained nurse, is in constant attendance.
