The baroness spent \$500,000 in trying to find her husband, but never succeeded. Her last money went three weeks ago. Old-time friends found her starving in a room in Rebecca street, North Side. Despite her misfortunes she refused to occupy quarters provided for her, and asked admission to the poorhouse. Her application was accepted. She has announced her intention of writing memoirs of the beginnings of the so-called coal and iron aristocracy of Pittsburg.—Times Democrat.

Judge Burn's Residence Destroyed
Between 10 and 11 o'clock Monday night the residence of Judge Thos. M. Burns was discovered to be on fire. Judge Burns having been awakened by the falling of a curtain pole on the gallery, the cloth of which had been burned away. The fire had then gained such headway that it was impossible to save some of the most valuable of the contents of the house. The alarm was turned in and the Fire Department reached the scene a few minutes later. Such effects as could be reached on the lower floor, including, piano, china closet, sideboard and a few other things were taken from the blazing structure, also the silverware and some of the cut glass, but the valuable library, and pictures that cannot be replaced, were destroyed.

The residence was a handsome two-story structure, situated on the corner of New Hampshire and Rutland streets Dr. B. B. Warrens residence being but forty feet distant on New Hampshire street. Back of the residence was a large barn between it and J. W. Jones' residence and across the street was the Martindale residence, in constant danger of adding material to the conflagration. Considering the nearness of these buildings and the high wind that was blowing, it was remarkable that the fire was restricted to the building in which it originated. The firemen kept the Warren residence saturated with water and chemical fluid, and beyond being badly scorched, no other damage was done to that building, but Mr. Warren will suffer considerable loss resulting from damage to the furniture in moving it from the house, as it did not seem possible that it could be saved. The high wind carried burning brands two blocks away, setting fire to Badon's livery stable, the Thiery residence, one block, and the Bourgeois' furniture store, three blocks distant. These were quickly put out.

The fire boys deserve praise for their brave fight in preventing the spread of the flames, and also credit is due to the Abita Fire Company for answering the call of distress and making the remarkable run from Abita to Covington in the remarkable time of twenty minutes, bringing their hand engine with them and being prepared for battle.
Mr. P. Martindale carried his mother from the second story of the burning building to the landing of the first floor and was then assisted by Mr. Louis Hebert in taking her from the building. All the occupants of the house barely had time to make their escape, with such clothing as they could secure in rushing out.
The loss to Judge Burns is about \$5,000. Insurance on the residence \$3,000, by the Nilson, Sears & Co. Agency in the Sun Insurance Co.
