School Matters. The trustees of the public school met Monday night, July 21, at lectures, Southern Hotel, and selected the following teachers for the coming year: E. E. Lyon, Principal, Miss Olivia Mather assistant; Miss C. Mathews, Miss Salome Seiler, Miss Anna Huff, Miss Louise Gages, who were teachers in school last year, and Miss Oberberg, of Clinton and Miss Daisy Morrison of Baton Rouge.

There will be nine months school, the first month as a pay school, the second and third on money to be raised by the trustees, and six months on the regular rate.

ORDINANCE NO. 97. An Ordinance repealing Ordinance No. 76, authorizing the Mayor of the town of Slidell to issue a certificate or certificates of indebtedness of the town of Slidell, Louisiana, for the sum of \$15,000.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, Louisiana, That Ordinance No. 96, adopted February 5th, 1907, authorizing the town of Slidell to issue a certificate or certificates of indebtedness of the town of Slidell, Louisiana, to the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), in aid of a high school and other public schools in the town of Slidell, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

Be it further ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, Louisiana, That this ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage.

Ordinance No. 98 was put before the council for adoption. Slidell, La., June 1, 1909.

ORDINANCE NO. 98. An ordinance providing for the issuance of school bonds by the town of Slidell, La., to the amount of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), bearing five per cent per annum interest from date, and appropriated to meet the payment of said bonds and interest, the funds to be derived by the town of Slidell, La., from the year 1908 to 1914, inclusive, and also certain unexpended balances; and further providing for the sale of said bonds, the proceeds thereof to be turned over to the Board of School Directors of the parish of St. Tammany, La., to be used in the erection of a public school building in the town of Slidell, La.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, La., That twenty (20) school bonds to the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1000) each, bearing five per cent per annum interest from date, payable annually, be issued by the Mayor and Secretary of the town of Slidell, La., as follows:

- 2 Bonds of \$1000 each, payable June 1, 1911.
2 Bonds of \$1000 each, payable June 1, 1911.
2 Bonds of \$1000 each, payable June 1, 1912.
3 Bonds of \$1000 each, payable June 1, 1913.
3 Bonds of \$1000 each, payable June 1, 1914.
4 Bonds of \$1000 each, payable June 1, 1915.

4 Bonds of \$1000 each, payable June 1, 1916.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the form of phraseology of said bonds and interest coupons shall be as follows:

Slidell, Louisiana, June 1, 1909.

The Treasurer of the Board of School Directors of St. Tammany Parish, La., will on June 1, 19 — pay to the holder of this bond the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000), with five per cent per annum interest thereon from date, as per attached interest coupon, out of the funds derived from the special five mill tax in aid of public schools levied by the town of Slidell, La., for the years 1906 to 1915, inclusive, which was specially appropriated to meet the payment of a series of school bonds issued by the said town of Slidell, La., said series of bonds having been issued by authority of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, La., and in pursuance of Act No. 84 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, of the year 1906.

Be it further ordained, etc., That the proceeds of the special tax in aid of public schools, levied by the town of Slidell, La., for the years 1906 to 1915, inclusive, authorized by a vote of the taxpayers of said town at a special election held therein on the 27th day of December, 1905, as well as all unexpended balances of taxes levied by said town for general purposes, over and above ordinary purposes, and the same are hereby appropriated and specially pledged to meet the payment of said bonds and interest thereon, as the same may mature.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That all funds derived from said special school tax, as soon as collected, be paid over to the Board of Public School Directors of St. Tammany Parish, La., in accordance with section 22 of act No. 214, of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, of the year 1902, to be held as a special deposit to meet the payment of said bonds and interest thereon, etc.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Mayor of the town of Slidell, La., be, and is hereby authorized to advertise said bonds for sale, for thirty (30) days, in the official journal of the town of Slidell, according to law. All bids for said bonds to be in writing and to be accompanied by a cash deposit of \$500.00, said bids to be received and considered by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Slidell, La., who shall award said bonds to the highest bidder, etc.

Sec. 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall take effect and have full force from date of its adoption.
