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THE BAPTIST ENCAMPMENT.

Annual Meeting Opens at Mandeville, La.

Interesting Addresses by Baptists Attending.

Mandeville, La., July 6.—The Baptist Encampment was formally opened at 11 o'clock this morning. Mr. U. G. Newhauser, of Slidell, La., the president, was in the chair. A fifteen-minute song service was conducted by C. W. James, of Mansfield. Arthur Flake, of Winona, Miss., discussed a very interesting and instructive lecture on the subject of measuring or grading the Sunday school. He is one of the field secretaries of the Sunday school board, and his talk showed that he is familiar with every detail of Sunday school work. He insisted on the necessity and the advantages of properly grading the Sunday schools. Dr. R. A. Venable, of Meridian, Miss., was the principal lecturer of the day. His subject was "John's Conception of God." He said that Christ had declared God to the world, and had revealed Him to the world as love and light. Dr. Venable will continue his lecture tonight, and his series will extend for several days. His eloquence and thorough knowledge as a theologian makes him very popular.

The programme for tomorrow is as follows: At 8:45, song service, conducted by C. W. James; 9:15, Sunday School Institute, by Arthur Flake, "My Sunday School," 10, service series, lecture by Rev. J. B. Lawrence, "Problems of Service in Louisiana," 10:45, recess ten minutes; 11, John and His Message; lecture, Dr. R. A. Venable, "His Message About Christ," afternoon, recreation; evening, 7:30, song service, conducted by C. W. James; 8, address on B. Y. P. U. work, Arthur Flake, of Mississippi; 8:30, "Our Educational Interests," address, Dr. E. O. Ware. A number of visitors are present already and many others are expected on the arrival of every boat and train. Many ladies are present to encourage the work, and among the male visitors and lecturers are C. W. James, of Mansfield, La.; Dr. R. A. Venable, of Meridian, Miss.; N. G. Sanitary Care of Food

In the summer time, when flies are plenty, the sugar bowl, jelly glasses, sauce dishes, syrup and cream pitchers and the pie, cake and pudding set to cool in the windows for the dinner dessert, all attract flies, wasps, bees, ants, roaches and other insects. Then there is the dust from the street, yard and room. Let any housekeeper test this by placing a sheet of white paper on the window sill under the jelly glass she sets there to thicken in the sun, or the pie or pudding set there to cool. How soon the white paper shows a film of dust, except where the glasses or plates covered it.

In some States the law requires dealers in foods eaten without peeling or cooking to keep them under glass covers. The same care should be taken to keep the covers on the sugar bowls and over the jelly glasses and all kinds of home prepared food. Children and even adults are prone to forget and leave the covers off, especially in the country. Each dish should have a fitted cover and whenever this becomes broken or defective as a dust and insect excluder it should be discarded. When cooling any dessert or other dish which is to be eaten cold, a clean meal sieve turned over it and a couple of thicknesses of cheese cloth put over that makes a very serviceable dust and insect protector. In the country, where the housekeeper has to do her own serving, often the dessert is set around at each plate, as well as much of the food put on the table, often in open dishes. There is always danger of food spoiling, especially in summer, from this practice. Soup tureens, gravy boats and all vegetable dishes should have their covers and even the bread should not be left to the inroads of flies and dust.—Picayune.

KING KOTTEN KARNIVAL.

Atlanta, Ga., July 6.—A King Kotten Karnival, to be held annually in some Southern city, changing its location each year, was the slogan sung by the commercial secretaries gathering here tonight for the First Annual Convention tomorrow of the Southern Commercial Secretaries' Association. The three K's is to be for the purpose of exploiting cotton and its byproducts and the thousands of articles into which cotton enters in some indispensable form. The carnival idea was brought here by Montgomery, and an effort will be made to hold the first carnival next year.

Every State in the South will be represented at the two sessions of the convention. In addition to commercial secretaries, prominent businessmen and railroad officials have signified their intention of attending. Nearly 100 secretaries already have spoken for accommodations. The discussions will cover the relations of State and municipal government and railroads to the advertising of the resources of Southern municipalities. Good roads will be studied in concrete form.

Rivalry for the honor of securing the next convention had already begun tonight. New Orleans, noted for the variety and aroma of sample inducements which it is accustomed to send out to win conventions for the Crescent City, was in the field with a modest booklet telling how good Creole cooking would taste and offering a trip to the Panama Canal for the next convention.

New Orleans began her fight for the Commercial Secretaries next annual convention with the arrival of M. B. Trezevant, secretary-manager of the New Orleans Progressive Union, and President of the Louisiana Commercial Secretaries' organization. This meeting will be one of the most important ever held in the South, not so much by the number of delegates as in the large number of Southern cities to be represented, over 100 cities in all parts of the South.

Mr. Trezevant began his campaign by mailing stories of the convention and New Orleans' bid for the next meeting to all the commercial organizations of the South. "New Orleans is anxious to get this convention," he said today, "and we believe we will win out. We will give the delegates a trip on a refrigerator ship to the Isthmus of Panama and will make arrangements with the government for a special train, so that three days can be passed most delightfully. The delegates will be most handsomely entertained every minute of the time they are our guests."

There are already some forty representatives of as many cities in Atlanta, the convention beginning tomorrow morning with addresses of welcome by the mayor and the president of the Chamber of Commerce.

Statistics of Cotton.

Atlanta, Ga., July 6.—A resolution introduced today in the House by Representative Ninson directs Georgia's representatives in Congress to support a bill requiring that statistics of cotton held in warehouses and otherwise by mills be compiled and published.

The resolution recites that cotton crop statistics as now gathered and published by the Federal Government are of great benefit to the buyers of cotton and that fair play requires that cotton stocks of mills be made known for the guidance of cotton producers in marketing their staple.

Another resolution by Mr. Ninson protests against fictitious dealings in agricultural products of the country by exchanges.—Picayune.

TAX ORDINANCE

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Police Jury of the parish of St. Tammany, That there be and is hereby levied for the year 1909 a tax of 8 mills upon the dollar upon all taxable property in the parish for general parochial purposes, divided as follows: That 4 mills are hereby appropriated therefrom for criminal expenses, 3 mills for the benefit of public schools, 1 mill for general expenses and 2 mills for the benefit of public roads upon all property in the parish subject to taxation, including that situated in the towns of Covington and Mandeville.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That the sheriff and tax collector shall receive the payment of parish taxes (the amount appropriated for public school purposes excepted) the fully approved certificates of the grand and petit jurors for per diem and mileage and certificates of members of the police jury for per diem and mileage, and that he proceed with the collection of taxes now levied according to law. CHARTER

OF THE THOMAS & WILLIAMS REALTY COMPANY, LTD.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.)

Be it known, that on this 31st day of the month of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and nine, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and thirty second; Before Me, Lewis Lovering Morgan, a Notary Public, duly commissioned, qualified and sworn in and for the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, therein residing, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who severally declared that, availing themselves of the laws of the State of Louisiana in such cases made and provided, they have covenanted and agreed, and do by these presents, covenant and agree to bind themselves, as well as all such persons as may hereafter become associated with them to form a corporation for the objects and purposes, and under the articles and stipulations following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be THOMAS & WILLIAMS REALTY COMPANY LTD., and under its corporate name it shall have power and authority to have and enjoy corporate existence and succession for the full term and period of ninety-nine (99) years from and after the date hereof; to contract, sue and be sued; to make and use a corporate seal, and the same to alter and break at its pleasure; to hold, receive, lease, purchase and convey, as well as mortgage and hypothecate property, real personal and mixed, and to incorporate, to name and appoint such managers, agents, directors and officers as its business, interest and convenience may require, and to make and establish, as well as alter and amend from time to time, such by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper government of the affairs of said corporation as may be necessary and proper.

ARTICLE II.

The domicile of said corporation shall be in the Town of Covington, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and all litigation and other legal process shall be served upon the President of said corporation, or in the event of his absence upon the Vice-President thereof; in the absence of both of said officers on the Secretary of said corporation.

ARTICLE III.

The objects and purposes for which this corporation is established and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be to purchase, lease and own, to cultivate and improve for its own use, or others and to let and lease, all real and personal property of every description whatsoever in any parish of the State of Louisiana or elsewhere in the United States, and generally to hold and exercise all such incidental powers and privileges as relate to the objects hereinabove set forth; as an adjunct thereto, to construct, own and operate steam boats, steam and electric railroads, warehouses and depots as may be necessary to do in the development and improvement of the land now owned or hereafter to be owned by this corporation; to build bridges for toll, bore for oil, gas or water and for minerals as to be owned by this corporation; and to do all things incident thereto.

ARTICLE IV.

The capital stock of said company is hereby fixed at the sum of eighty thousand dollars, divided into and represented by 800 shares of stock, of the par value of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars each. Said stock to be paid in and after such notice to the subscribers as may be fixed by the Board of Directors, or the same may be issued at not less than par for labor done, or property actually received by the corporation.

The corporation to become a going concern and be authorized to do business as soon as ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars of its capital stock shall have been subscribed for.

ARTICLE V.

All the corporate powers of said corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Directors to be composed of not less than three nor more than five stockholders to be elect-

ed annually on the first Monday in July of each year, except the first Board appointed in this Charter, who shall hold their office until the first Monday in July 1910, and two (2) Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

At such elections shall be held by ballot and conducted at the office of said corporation, under the supervision of three (3) Commissioners to be appointed by the Board of Directors, and the Board of Directors being empowered to decrease or increase its number at pleasure. Notice of such election shall be given by the Secretary of this corporation by publication for not less than ten (10) days prior thereto in a newspaper published in the Town of Covington, St. Tammany Parish, Louisiana.

At all such elections and at all corporate meetings, every stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for each share of stock standing in his name on the books of the Company, to be cast in person or by his written proxy, and a majority of the votes cast shall elect.

Any vacancy occurring among the Directors by death, resignation or otherwise shall be filled by election for the remainder of the term by the remaining Directors.

The failure to elect Directors on the date above specified shall not dissolve the corporation nor impair its corporate management, but the Directors then in office shall remain in office until their successors are elected and qualified.

The Board of Directors shall elect from their own number a President and Vice President. They shall also elect a Secretary and Treasurer, or one person who shall be both, either of whom may or may not be members of the Board. They may, from time to time, name and appoint all such other officers and agents as it may deem necessary for the purposes and business of this corporation.

ARTICLE VI.

The Board may make and establish, as well as alter and amend, any and all by-laws, rules and regulations necessary and proper in its judgment for the conduct, support and management of the business and affairs of said corporation. The Board shall have full power and authority to borrow money, to execute mortgages and create liens; to issue bonds, notes and other obligations, and generally to do all things reasonable, convenient and necessary for the proper carrying on of the business of this corporation.

ARTICLE VII.

Whenever this corporation may be dissolved, either by limitation or from any other cause, its affairs shall be liquidated by three (3) Commissioners to be appointed from among the stockholders, at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for such purpose, of which meeting notice shall be given in the manner and time provided for stockholders' meeting by Article 7 of this Charter, and a majority in amount of the capital stock of said corporation, represented at such meeting, shall be requisite to elect. The said Commissioners shall remain in office until the affairs of said corporation shall have been fully liquidated.

ARTICLE VIII.

In case of death of one or more of said Commissioners, the vacancy shall be filled by election by the surviving Commissioner.

ARTICLE IX.

Warren Thomas and C. Z. Williams shall constitute the first Board of Directors of this corporation, with Warren Thomas as President, and Mrs. C. Z. Williams as Secretary-Treasurer, to serve as such until the first Monday in July 1910, or until their successors shall have been elected and qualified.

Thus done and passed in my office, in the Town of Covington, St. Tammany Parish, State of Louisiana, on the day, month and year first above written, in the presence of J. M. Claverie and E. D. Kentzel, two competent witnesses, who have signed these presents with the said appearers and me, Notary, after due reading of the whole.


