Covington La., July 8, 1909.

The Council of the town of Covington, La., met in called session on above date, all members having qualified.

Present—E. V. Richard, Mayor; E. J. Frederick, Jacob Seiler, P. J. Lacroix, J. Louis Smith, Leon Hebert, Maurice P. Planche.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

It was moved by Jacob Seiler, seconded by J. Louis Smith, that E. J. Richard be elected Secretary of the Council and City Tax Collector.

Carried.

It was moved by P. J. Lacroix, seconded by M. P. Planche, that P. J. Dulion be elected Marshal of the town of Covington, La.

Carried.

It was moved by Jacob Seiler, seconded by P. J. Lacroix, that G. M. Loyd be elected Night Marshal of the town of Covington, La.

Carried.

It was moved by E. J. Frederick, seconded by P. J. Lacroix, that the St. Tammany Farmer be elected official organ of the town of Covington, La., the pay to be the same as heretofore.

Carried.

It was moved by P. J. Lacroix, seconded by J. Louis Smith, that Jacob Seiler be elected Mayor pro tem.

Carried.

It was moved by J. Louis Smith, seconded by P. J. Lacroix, that the Tax Collector and Treasurer be required to furnish a bond of \$1000 each.

Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Jacob Seiler, seconded by Mr. P. J. Lacroix, that salary of the Mayor be \$850, payable quarterly, for the ensuing year.

Carried.

It was moved by Jacob Seiler, seconded by P. J. Lacroix, that the salary of the Secretary and City Tax Collector be \$600, payable quarterly, for the ensuing year.

Carried.

It was moved by J. Louis Smith, seconded by Jacob Seiler, that the salary of the Treasurer be \$100, payable quarterly, for the ensuing year.

Carried.

The City Attorney, having agreed to serve without pay, his offer was accepted with thanks.

It was moved by J. Louis Smith and seconded by Jacob Seiler that a vote of thanks be tendered Messrs. Hood and Poole for their valuable services while members of the last Council.

The Mayor appointed the following committees: Finance Committee—J. Louis Smith, chairman; E. J. Frederick and Leon Hebert.

Improvement Committee.—Jacob Seiler, chairman; Maurice Planche and P. J. Lacroix.

The report from the City Attorney, with attached correspondence, was read and ordered spread on the minutes. It will be published in full next week.

It was moved by E. J. Frederick and seconded by P. J. Lacroix that a good mule be bought for use of the town.

It was moved by Jacob Seiler and seconded by P. J. Lacroix that a horse for use by the Marshal be acquired.

The following report from the Chief of the C. V. Fire Department was read: Covington, La., June 15, 1909. City Council:

Gentlemen—This is to notify you that our fire department tried plug pull in the town, and find same as good as could be expected from the size of plug. The water pressure was as good as could be expected, considering the plug and size of same tried by our company, and water pressure could not be better under the circumstances. However I wish to state that the plug is not a standard fire plug.

The following statement was read: In the year ending July 1, 1909, there were 244 cases tried by the Mayor, \$1,150 85 collected in fines; \$45 for entertainments, and \$17 50 for building permits.

There was paid out \$716 55 for board of prisoners, which at 60cts per day ought to represent 1194 days work, but does not actually, as that includes Sundays, rainy days and days which prisoners could not or would not work or were too sick to work.

There was paid out \$309 30 to Mrs. Miles for board of parish prisoners, representing 512 days work.

Paid to deputies for guarding prisoners, \$284 00.

About eight and one-half squares length of streets and avenues have been shelled.

Over 44,268 feet of streets and avenues have been graded.

The work done by Simpson's Branch by prisoners can only be appreciated by those living in the immediate neighborhood. High water, usually following a heavy rain, is nearly a thing of the past. A few more weeks work will complete the drainage of all that portion of New Covington, drained by the branch.
